Parent-Teacher Groups Plan Rupert Book Week Contest

Parent-teacher groups in
Prince Rupert have taken over
from the library board the pro-
ject of promoting observance of
Young Canada Book Week.
Plans for which were discussed
at a special meeting of the
Prince Rupert Library Board
with P-TA representatives last
night.

Young Canada Book Week
will be observed November 15
to 22, with some type of contest
for local students. The week,
observed throughout Canada, is
designed to build up library
membership and to encourage
young people to read good lit-
erature.

In the past in Prince Rupert,

the library board has organized
contests for students in grades
four to eight, usually consisting
of essays on books they have
read. Books are given as prizes.
This year, parent-teacher
groups will take over the pro-
ject, probably introducing a
new type of contest for a wider
range of students, possibly in-
cluding high school students.

At last night's meeting, rep-
resentatives of the various par-
ent-teacher groups accepted re-
sponsibility for the project this
year and planned a meeting
next Wednesday to finalize
plans for active observance of
the book week. Mrs. W. S. Ker-
gin has been named chairman.

Civic Centre Plans Adult Classes in Popular Dancing

The new dancing classes at
the Civic Centre are still grow-
ing, and another class, this one
for adults interested in popular
and ballroom dancing, is plan-
ned.

Registration in the junior
classes, for ballroom, tap or bal-
let dancing, has now reached
200.

If registration is sufficient for
the senior classes in popular
dancing, they will start next
Friday night. Only a few more
are needed for the first class.

Buddy Taft, dancing instruc-
tor, hopes to start these classes
with the basic steps such as fox
trot and waltz and then, if the
class so desires, he will start
more complicated steps such as

tangos, rhumbas, sambas and
others.

These popular dance steps
will be taught from 7 to 8 o'clock
Friday nights, and from 8 to 9
the same nights there will be a
class in ballroom dancing if
enough interest is shown.

Registration for these classes
is expected to increase even
more after the big membership
drive October 5, plans for which
are now well under way.

Stan Saville has set up the
districts to be covered by the
teams of canvassers and team

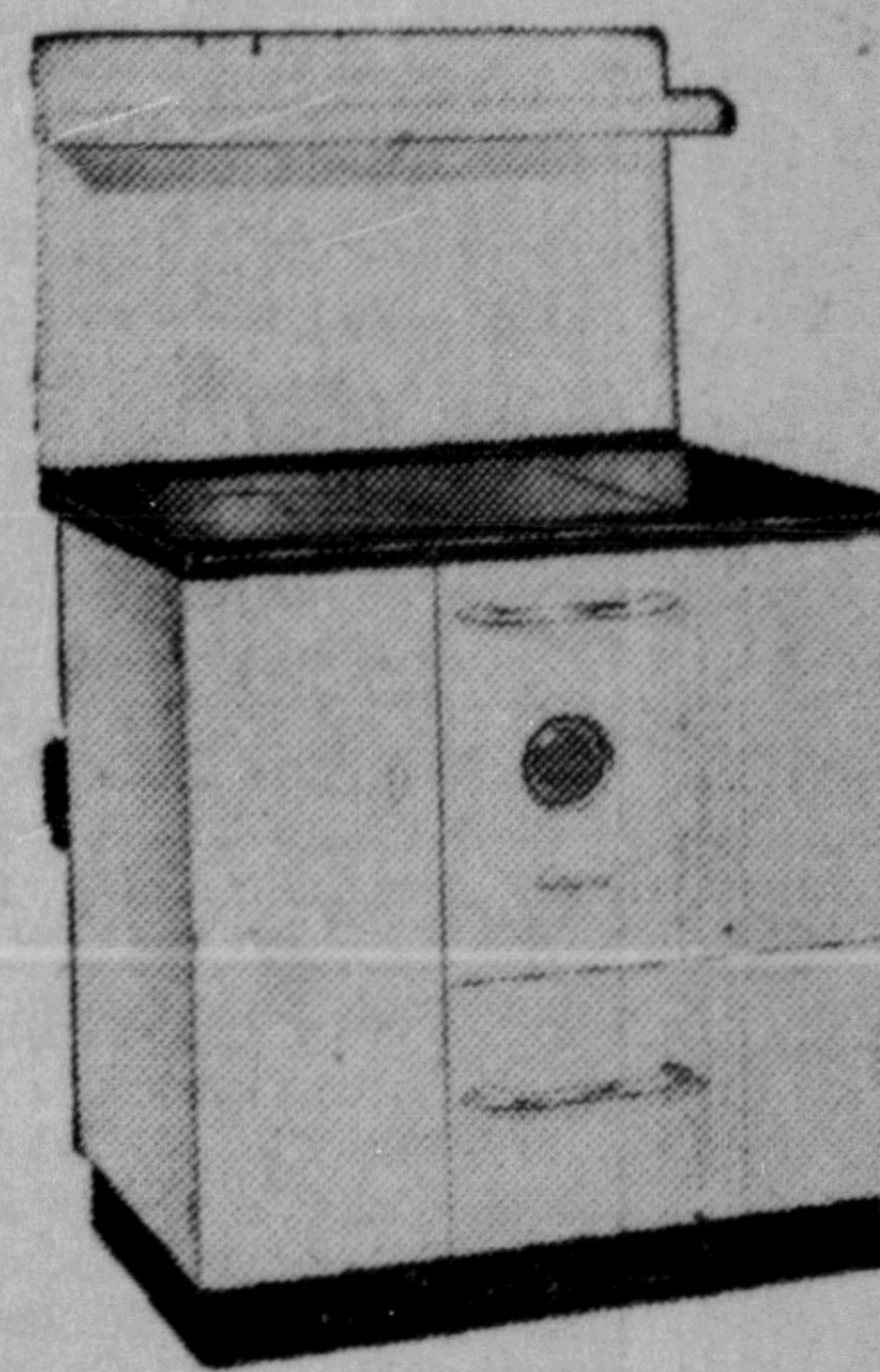
