BLACKWOOD on Bridge

No Game or Slam Made on This Hand—
Just Beautiful Bit of Defensive Playing

Most of the time we bridge writers give you hands that are bid to game or slam. That is because there is usually more drama in such hands than in mere part-score deals. The gains and losses are greater.

But believe me, many sensational plays are made on the "little" hands. Today's hand was played at a contract of three spades and it contains one of the finest defensive plays I ever saw.

Mr. Abel opened the 10 of clubs and dummy's ace won. Mrs. Keen then led the lone heart from the board and put in the jack when Mr. Masters played low. Mr. Abel won with the ace and returned another club.

ABSTAINED

Mrs. Keen trumped this trick, led a small heart and ruffed it, noting the fall of Mr. Masters' queen. She led a spade from the dummy. Mr. Masters played the four-spot and won with the 10.

Now she led another heart and ruffed it with dummy's last spade.

This is where Mr. Masters made the killing defensive play. He could have over-ruffed with his nine of spades and, in fact, was very tempted to do so.

But he abstained, discarding a club. If he had over-ruffed, Mrs. Keen could have made her nine tricks. As it was she was bound to be defeated.

SET

You see, she was faced with a serious problem in returning to her hand. Whatever she led was going to deplete her already dwindling trump supply. After some thought she led a club and ruffed it with the jack of spades. Next came the king of hearts and this time Mr. Masters won with the nine of spades and led back a club.

When Mrs. Keen ruffed this, she had one trump left. If she led a trump Mr. Masters would win and the defenders would then take three diamond tricks.

Desperately, she led another good heart. But now Mr. Abel made the key of trumps for a trick. He cashed the ace of diamonds and led another diamond which Mrs. Keen ruffed. The ace of trumps represented the setting trick.

Financing Education

A new plan of education cost division between Provincial and municipal governments is proposed by the Union of B.C. Municipalities and if it is adopted, Prince Rupert would save "about \$84,000 this year," city council was told last night.

A letter from UBCM read at council Monday night stated an investigation had been carried out by W. E. Hobbs, education expert who proposed provincial government and municipality split education costs on a 80-20 basis.

The same is suggested for the three present sales tax due to municipalities.

A meeting February 21 in Vancouver has been called by the UBCM to hear Mr. Hobbs' report and to form a resolution. Aldermen George Hills and Michael Kreuger are delegated to attend. They expect to be in Vancouver at that time on private business.
