Although Colonel Young declined to quote a figure, he reported last week on returning from an inspection trip to Whitehorse that the disease had affected a total of 53 Canadian servicemen and their dependents. Civilian sources then reported 80 cases.







VANCOUVER (CP)-An ambassador's brother and a member of the 1939 royal train crew, Edward Bull, Canadian National Railways train baggageman, lifted his last pieces off the train this morning.

He is retiring on pension after serving 45 years with the CNR, making him the senior trainman west of the Great Lakes. As he completed his "last run," many of his railway friends were at the depot to greet him and wish him many years of health to enjoy his retirement.

The highlight of "Eddie" Bull's career came in 1939 when he was assigned to the royal train carrying the late King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, now the Queen Mother, from Vancouver to Kamloops.

The son of a doctor in Oslo, Norway, Mr. Bull came to Canada in 1907 to go farming in Saskatchewan. He is the only member of his family to come

His brother, Iens, entered the Norwegian civil service and was a deputy minister at the time of the German invasion in 1940.

He spent the war years in Sweden but, with liberation, returned to Norway and was appointed ambassador to Holland. For the past year he has been Norwegian ambassador to Den-

"Eddie" has not seen him, or any other member of the family, since 1913.

Mr. Bull thinks he may go back to Norway for a visit, now that he is retired, but he still prefers Canada and intends to continue living here.




