From India, China passed the art of self-defence to Japan, the nation which adopted it as a national physical science. Prof. Jigoro Kano worked out the present judo system, known by his name, several decades ago. Two schools, one in Tokyo, the other in London, give the recognized official instruction of Kano judo.

Don Raleigh got the only New York goal on a passing play with Gaye Stewart and Hy Butler early in the third period.

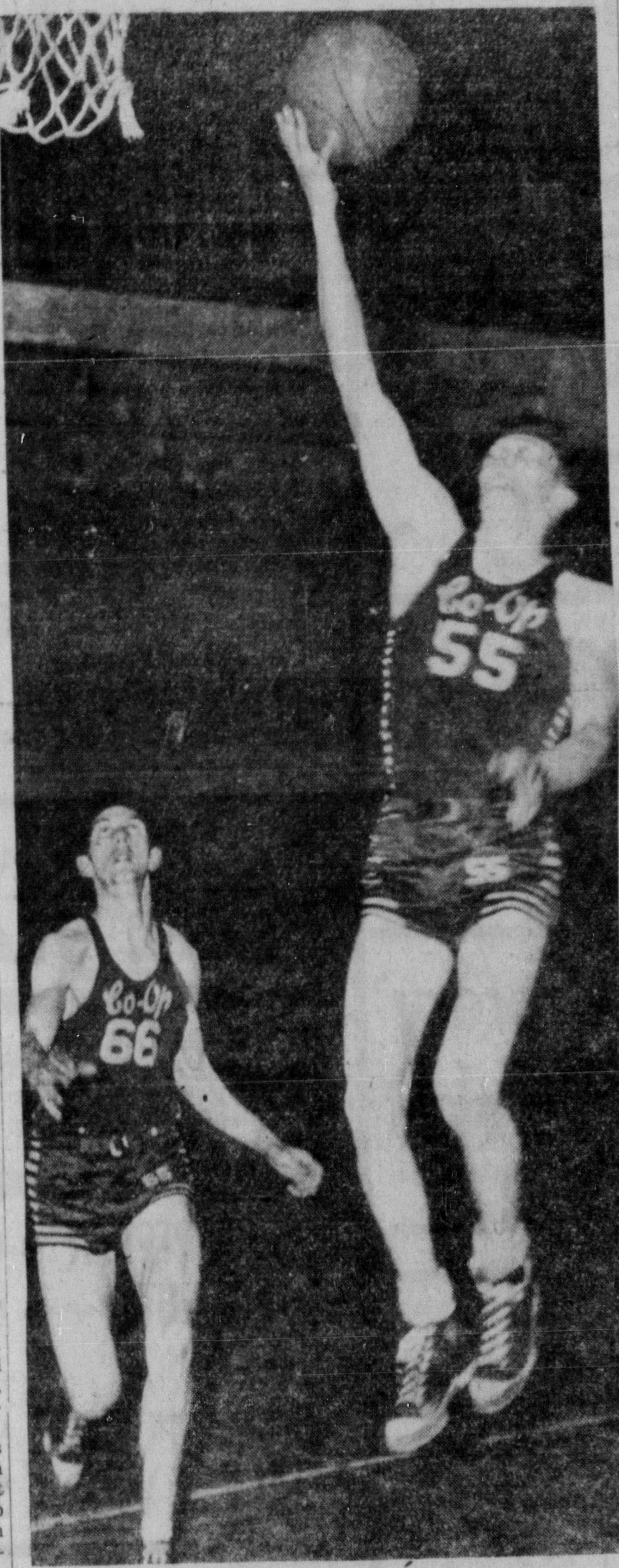
The Leafs came back quickly with Cal Gardner scoring what turned on a pass from Harry Watson.

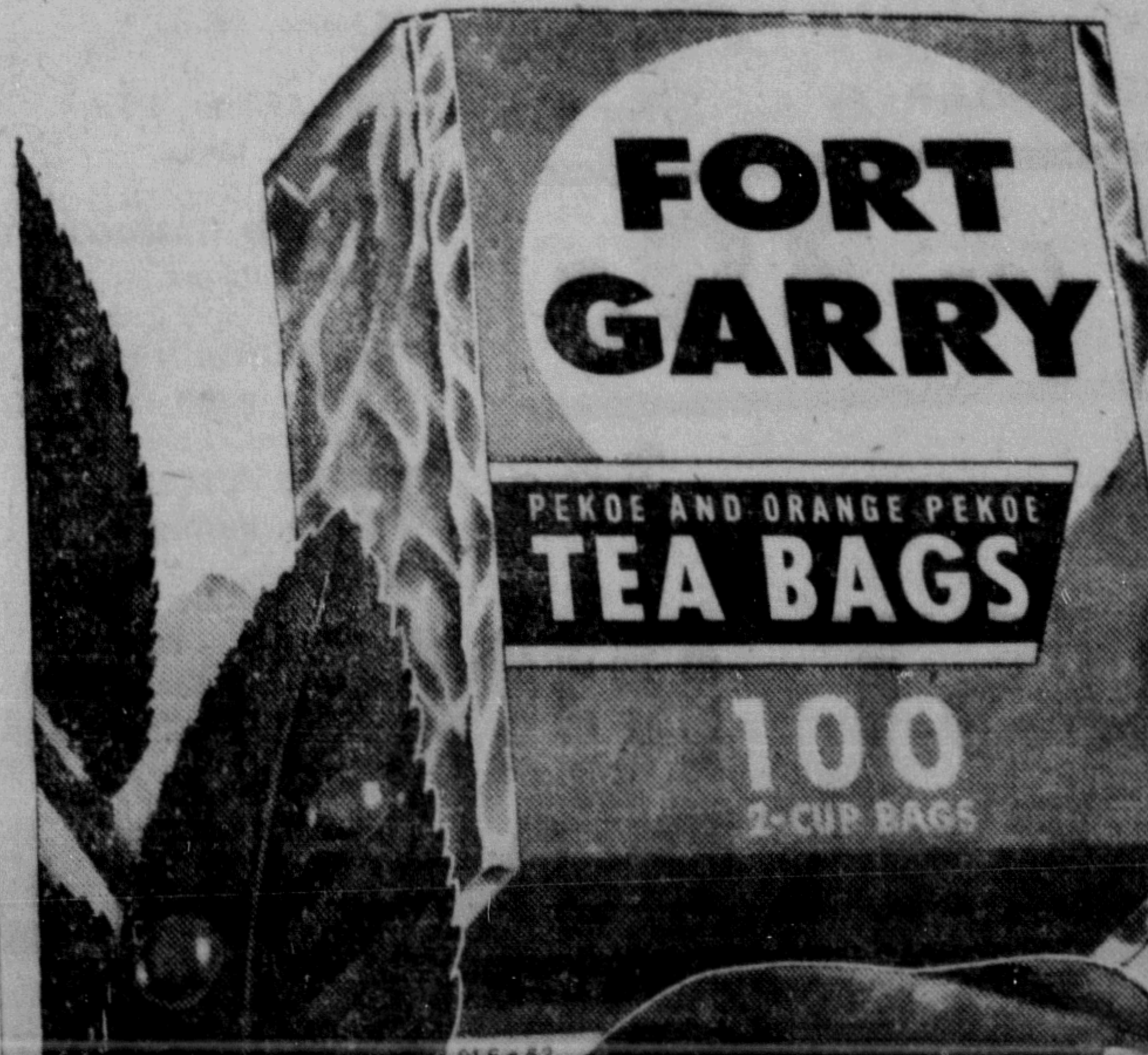
