

OTTAWA-Seeking to improve with no evening sitting. its own working conditions, the House of Commons, sessions of which opened today, is shortly expected to come to a final de-

The expectation is that the Commons will adopt a schedule giving members Wednesday and Friday nights off, leaving only three night sittings a week-Monday, Tuesday and Thursday. That was the schedule with which the House finished up last December, after experimenting with various combinations of

hours for two months. The old hours appear definitely to be on the way out. Under or so. them, the chamber sat daily-Monday through Friday-from 3 p.m. to 11 p.m., with a dinner break from 6 to 8 p.m. But Wednesday evenings were free in the early stages of each session.

These hours, adopted during the 19th century, drew a lot of complaints. Year after year members called for revision, suggesting that 11 p.m. was too late to finish work, especially when they must be back in the morning for committee meetings.

Nothing was done until early last fall when a special committee representing all parties met and suggested several combinations of hours be tried on an experimental basis.

First, the chamber sat a week from 1:30 to 7 p.m. daily without a break. The members didn't






