

British Health Service Overcomes Growing Pains

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain's national health service, which had a stormy beginning five years ago, now has settled down to a more or less peaceful existence.

The controversies which it at first aroused have died down. Even those who were its bitterest opponents now accept as a fact that the conception of free or almost free, medical attention for everyone from duke to street cleaner is here to stay.

Three classes of people still grumble about the service:

- Loyalists complain that they have to work too long and too

hard for sufficient rewards under the scheme.

- Labor Party politicians are angry because the Conservative government introduced some charges to the public instead of keeping the service entirely free.
- Economic experts watch with anxiety as the cost of the services increases year by year.

During the present financial year, the cost may rise for the first time over the £500,000,000 mark.

The ordinary patient seldom hinks of astronomical figures like this when he sits in the doctor's waiting room.

The sum he is likely to think about is the 10 pence a week automatically deducted from his wages to help finance the scheme. He probably decides that he is getting a good bargain.

Once he has registered with a local doctor, he and his family get all the medical treatment they need for nothing. If he doctor decides to send him to a hospital or to see a specialist, that will be free, too.

Medicines supplied by the druggist on the doctor's prescription cost the patient the nominal sum of one shilling.

If his teeth are giving him trouble, he is expected to pay up to the first £1 of the dentist's bill. False teeth are supplied at half price. Spectacles from the optician are also provided at half price.

Free pre-natal services are provided for his wife and the baby will be delivered without cost.

Girl Urges Wolf-Hunting In Canada With Borzois

LONDON (CP)—Ursula Cartland, an authority on Borzoi dogs, thinks Canada should establish a new national sport—wolf hunting with hounds.

Miss Cartland, a tall blonde from Stettin, Germany, now is in London renting her Borzoi dogs to film companies. She says that of all the countries in the western world, Canada has the greatest need for a revival of the old Russian sport of "coursing" wolves—catching the quarry with a small number of fast dogs hunting by sight.

"It could become a national sport," she said. "If Canada wants to get rid of its wolves—the four-legged variety, of course—this is the way to do it."

Miss Cartland figures that coursing would be a lucrative

sport in Canada, with each skin bringing \$50 in government bounties. Her dream is to set up a kennel of at least 60 trained Borzois for wolf-hunting around Hudson Bay.

FAST HUNTERS

Stroking the silky heads of "fox tail, red-eyed Borzois she keeps for breeding and for work in films and advertising, Miss Cartland said in an interview: "Borzoi are docile, obedient pets—but they have one of the oldest and fastest hunting records."

It will be some time before Miss Cartland can achieve her Canadian ambition. It takes too much capital to get started. "The dogs would have to be kept for a year and trained on wolves," she said.

She now earns £10 a day renting her Borzois, 3½-year-old Teufel and Yeres, 8, for work in Rex Harrison's latest movie, "The Constant Husband." As part of the fee, it's her job to see the dogs do exactly what is required.

Girls of Any Age Get Chance To Enter Doll Competition

The women's division of the Canadian National Exhibition has issued a challenge to all Canadian girls, young or old, who still are fascinated by dolls.

The exhibition is staging a doll contest, with attractive prizes offered for the best-dressed doll and already entries are promised from many parts of Canada, as well as from several other countries.

First doll to arrive is an authentic cowgirl, dressed by Roy Rogers' wife, Dale Evans. Another is promised by 76-year-old Mundi Johnson of Gimli, Man., who will send a doll in Icelandic costume.

The competition will be judged in two classes, senior, for groups and individuals 16 years and over, and junior, for groups and individuals 15 and under.

Prizes offered in the senior group are \$100, \$75 and \$50, and for juniors, \$75, \$50 and \$25.

Dolls must be not less than 14 inches and not more than 21 inches in height. They may depict any age, personality, character or shape. Dresses may be period, modern, national or "out of this world" in design.

All dolls entered will become the property of the CNE and will be distributed through recognized charities to little girls for Christmas.

Entry forms are available from the Women's Division, Canadian National Exhibition, Exhibition Park, Toronto, and dolls must be in possession of the CNE by July 1, 1954.

Judging will be on the basis of workmanship, originality and costume design.

Elsa Jenkins, organizer of the contest, noting that the contest seems to have caught the imagi-

ination of youth organizations particularly, including Girl Guides, Boy Scouts, CGIT and others, stresses that there is no age limit for entries, and that boys are eligible, as well as girls.

All Bremerton To Be Evacuated In Attack Test

BREMERTON Wash. (AP)—The U.S. nation's first planned evacuation of an entire city under simulated H-bomb attack will be carried out June 24 in this Puget Sound naval shipyard centre of 35,000 persons.

"Operation rideout" was the name given the test.

The practice exercise will be the second in the state in less than two months. Some 18,000 persons evacuated a 10-block square area of downtown Spokane April 26 in "Operation walk-out," the first of its kind in the country.

Every available vehicle will be pressed into service to get presumed safety of the city's outskirts.

Even ferries, which link Bremerton with Seattle across the sound, will help in the evacuation.

"Operation ride-out" will be staged between 4:30 and 6 p.m.

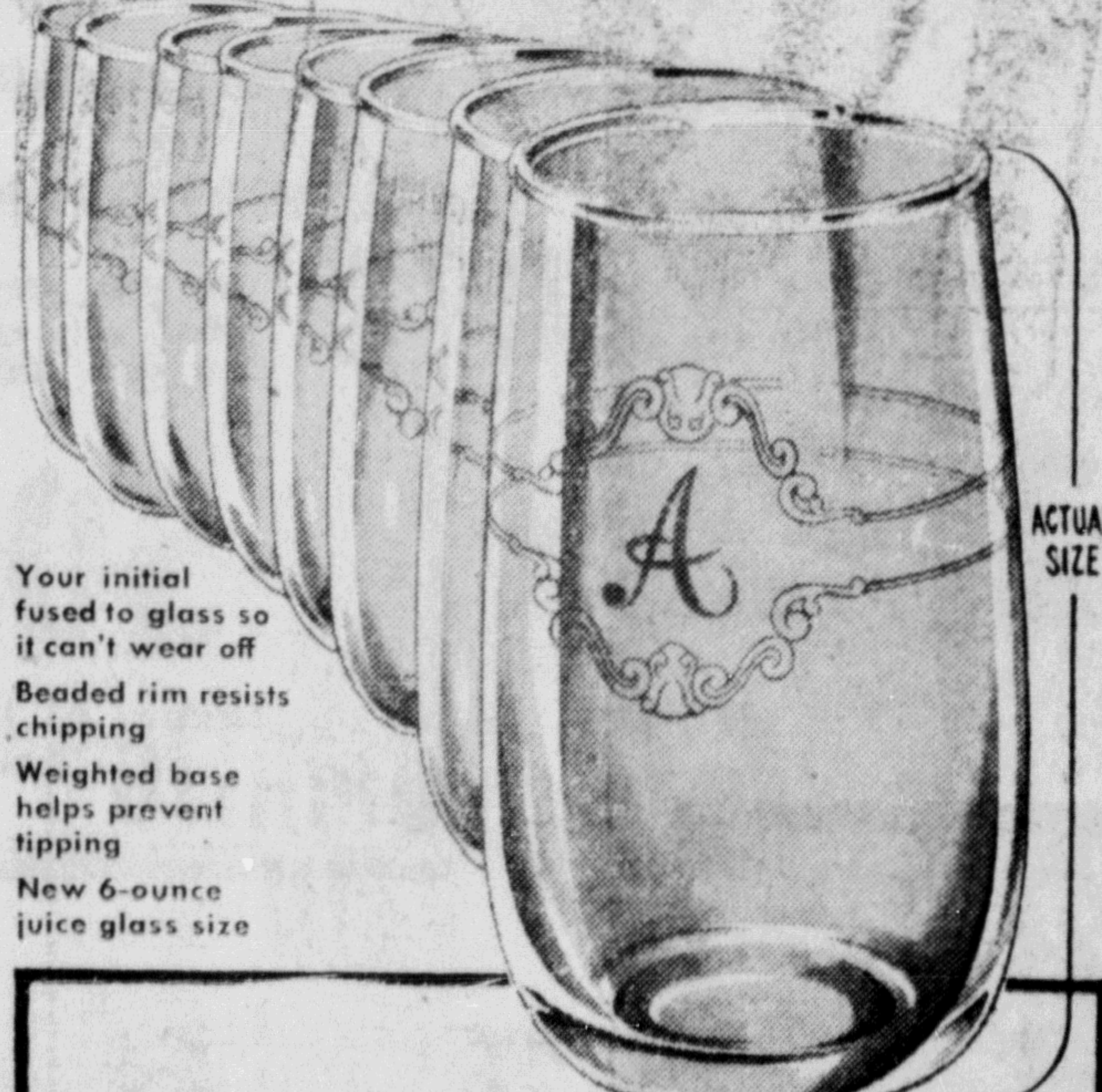

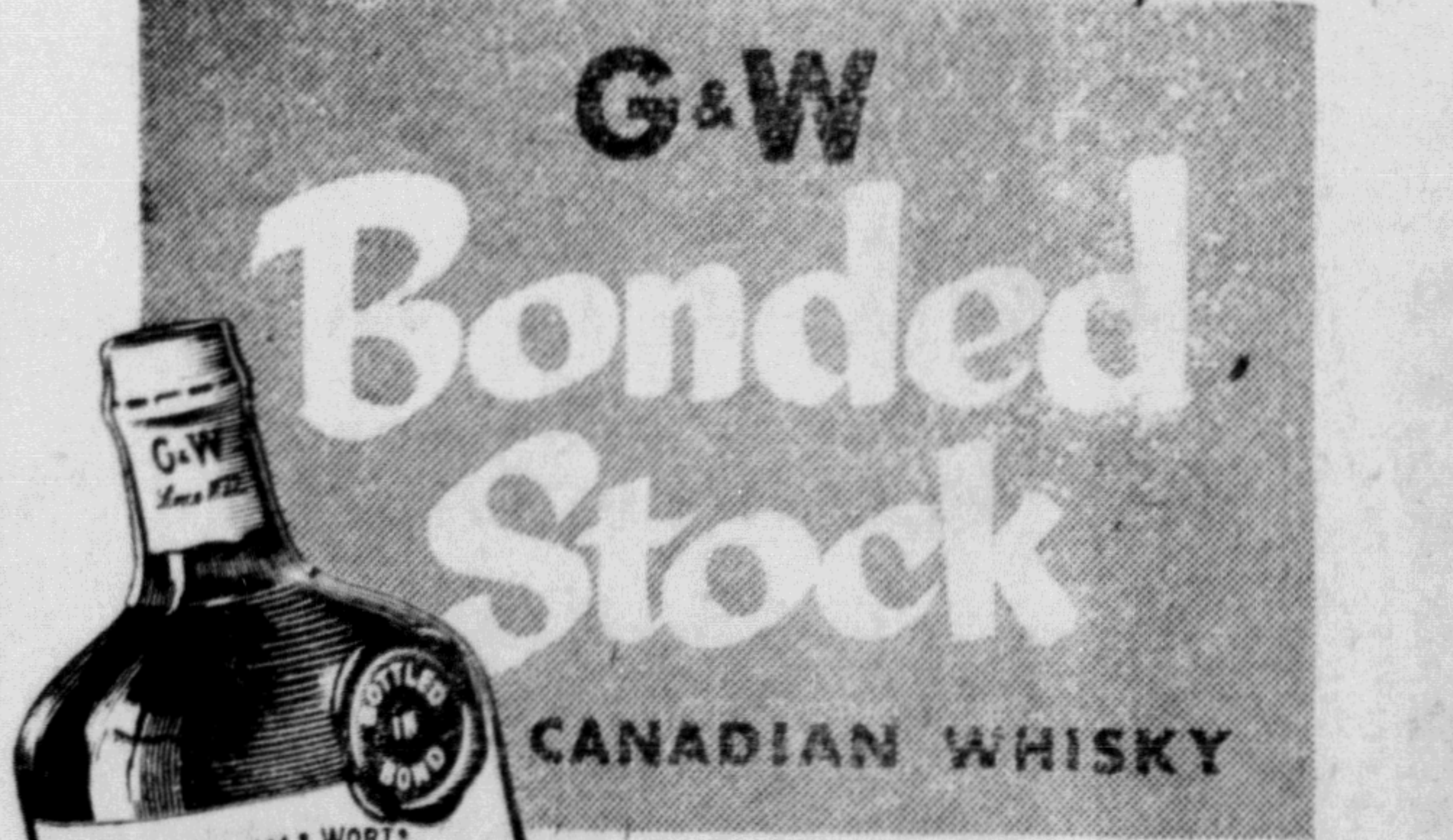
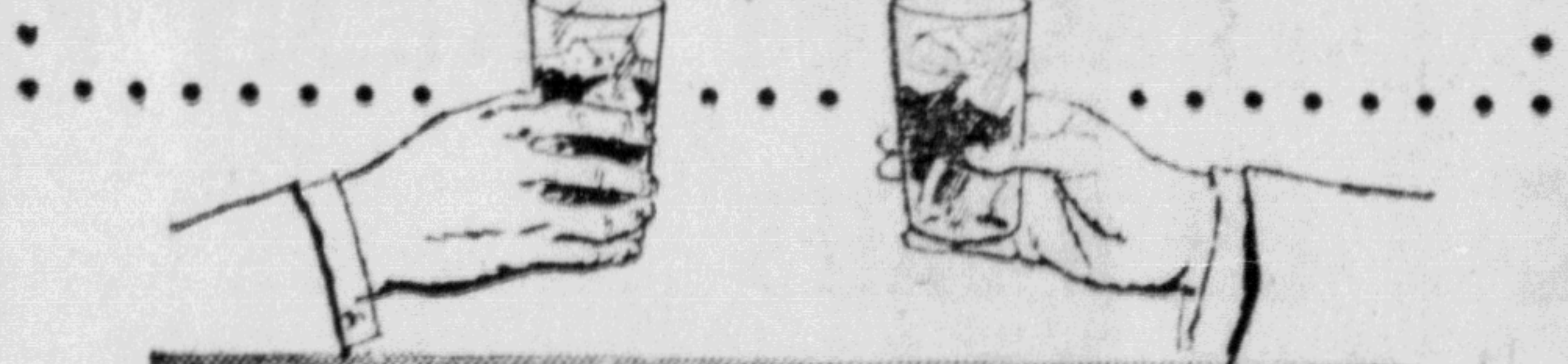
