## Commission Non-Committal

Making No Guarantee To Northern B.C. Co. In Event of Franchise Change

B.C. Power Commission has turned thumbs down on a Northern B.C. Power Co. Ltd. proposal that the Commission guarantee a specific price plus a fair return on invested capital for any equipment in use should the Commission take over supplying power for Prince Rupert.

The Northern B.C. Power Co. has been requesting that special provision be made, should there be a change in the power franchise, for compensation in respect to additional diesel generating equipment which the company now deems necessary to install as a safeguard against possible power shortage in view of rapidly increasing demand.

The request was placed before the Commission last week by City Clerk R. W. Long and Ald. H. M. Daggett, city delegates to Victoria.

If and when the Commission should take over, a board of arbitration must be set up to fix a value on the assets of Northern B.C. Power Co. and such a price would be final, delegates were told.

Meanwhile, the Commission said it could give no forecast of rates it would charge in this area, but might be able to give estimates of costs after reviewing reports of the Public Utilities Commission on the power company's assets.

Delegates reported they were told that the Commission com-

putes rates for each locality by pooling production costs of all Commission operations, then adding local distribution costs.

Any council action to make application to the Commission was tabled until return of a PUC report, expected early this month.
