



General's Name To Go Before New Hampshire Primary

WASHINGTON, D.C. (9-Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's name will be entered officially in the contest for the Republican presidential nomination.

Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachussetts said Sunday he has personal assurance from the General that he is a Republican. On this basis, Lodge said he is entering Eisenhower's name in the New Hampshire presidential primary. He said Eisenhower "is prohibited by Army regulations from engaging directly or indirectly in a nomination compaign" while in uniform but that he is certain that the General is in the presidential race" to the fin-

The New Hampshire primary will be held March 11 and there will be a "finish fight" to get the nemination for Eisenhower, Lodge said.
