## Challenge of Prayer Price

Speaker Outlines What Must  
Be Done to be Effective

Over one hundred prayer  
Christians gathered in  
the Lutheran Church last  
in the fourth of the  
inter-denominational  
services, sponsored by the  
Rupert Ministerial Associa-  
tion and were challenged by  
Rev. J. E. Harris, Principal of  
the Bible School, who is  
as the special speaker for  
the week with the need for fac-  
ing up to a price that must be  
for prevailing prayer.

Rev. H. E. Olsen, St. Paul's  
Methodist Church, directed the  
time and Senior Captain G.  
Tyke read the Scripture por-  
tions and led in extemporaneous  
prayers to which Angus Thomson  
and Wakada responded  
with heart-searching prayers.  
Mr. Harris said "there are four  
things we must do, and they are  
costly to the average person.  
We must be willing to give  
and seek privacy. This is  
an injunction laid upon us by  
God, secondly we must make a  
complete break with sin and the  
world that we once had for its  
sins in the flesh. Thirdly  
we must be a conciliatory spirit  
forgiving heart toward  
men. And, fourthly, prayer  
must be offered in the name of  
our Christ."

**PEACE AT SCHOOL**


R. E. Harris spoke to the

## Taft Claims Enough Votes

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Taft (R-OHIO) claimed today if all the pledges he now holds are translated into voting strength, he will win the republican presidential nomination.

That was the Ohioan's answer to the statement of General Dwight D. Eisenhower that he is a republican and would respond to a "clearcut call to political duty" but would not personally campaign for the GOP nomination.

Eisenhower supporters jubilantly heralded his statement as assuring the general's nomination and election.

Taft told a reporter he believes this makes Eisenhower only a "draft" possibility, adding:

"If all the pledges we have obtained from all over the country can be translated into delegates when they are chosen, I believe we have more than half of the convention votes."

The GOP nominating meeting, to be held in Chicago early in July, will have slightly more than 1200 delegates, with more than 600 votes needed for the nomination. None of the delegates has been formally chosen yet.

Taft said he always assumed that other candidates would be seeking the nomination and that "General Eisenhower would be one of them."

## Surveying of Alaska Ports

KETCHIKAN.—Charles E. Clark of the U. S. army engineers, Anchorage, plans to complete a port terminal survey of Ketchikan within another week, then go to Annette Island for similar studies at Metlakatla and Tangass Harbor, he reported here today.

Clark made a survey of Wrangell and Petersburg before coming here, and other engineers are making economic and traffic studies as well as warehouse reports of other Alaskan ports.

The information will be sent to Washington to be used by other federal agencies having to do with Alaska development, it is believed. These may include the forest service, interior department and perhaps the RFC which has been asked to help finance inauguration of a car ferry service between Prince Rupert and Haines.


