Slimmer Silhouette And Soft Fullness For Spring 1953, Dress Designers Say

NEW YORK.—Fashion designers here opened their doors last week to show buyers from all over the United States what they are presenting for spring '53. These new trends will also find their way into the Canadian fashion picture.

What stands out in nearly all collections is wearability. This is noted in the slim, uncluttered suits which play a big part in many showrooms, together with the costume and slim dress.

Color is secondary to navy, black, beige and grey.

Newest evening clothes stop at waltz length, just above the ankles, while daytime skirt lengths are about an inch longer than last year. Big skirts fall slim over the hips and bell out below.

Liver Richest Food in Iron Provides Delicate Flavors

Nutritionists tell us that liver is the richest of all foods in iron. This is something to keep in mind when planning the meals. Because calves' or veal liver is the most tender and delicate in flavor it is more popular and higher priced than either pork or beef liver, but pork and beef liver provide just as good eating as their more tender relative if they are properly cooked.

It is quite understandable that livers are not all the same size. A beef liver weighs about ten pounds, calf liver weighs from two to two and one-half pounds and a pork from three to four pounds. Liver may be bought whole or sliced and one pound will serve four people.

Calves' liver is light reddish-brown in color while beef liver is a darker reddish-brown. Pork is also dark reddish-brown in color but it may be distinguished by its netted or web-like appearance.

When buying sliced liver it is well to check the slices to see that they are of even thickness. If they are thinner at one end, that end will be overcooked before the thick end is done. Liver is perishable so should be refrigerated and used as soon as possible after buying it. It is a tender meat except for the tough "skin" or "membrane" and the tubes which run through it. The skin may be removed by inserting a sharp knife under it at one point and pulling or scraping the skin away from the meat. The tubes should be cut out with sharp pointed scissors.

LIVER AND BACON

To those who enjoy the distinctive flavor of liver there's nothing as good as liver fried with bacon. Calf and beef liver are both good for frying. Those who like pork liver find it acceptable when fried but it definitely has a stronger flavor than the other two.

For frying liver it is best to use slices about $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch thick. First, the slices should be dredged in well-seasoned flour and since the liver itself is a very



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
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Fourth Prayer Week Session Draws Largest Congregation
