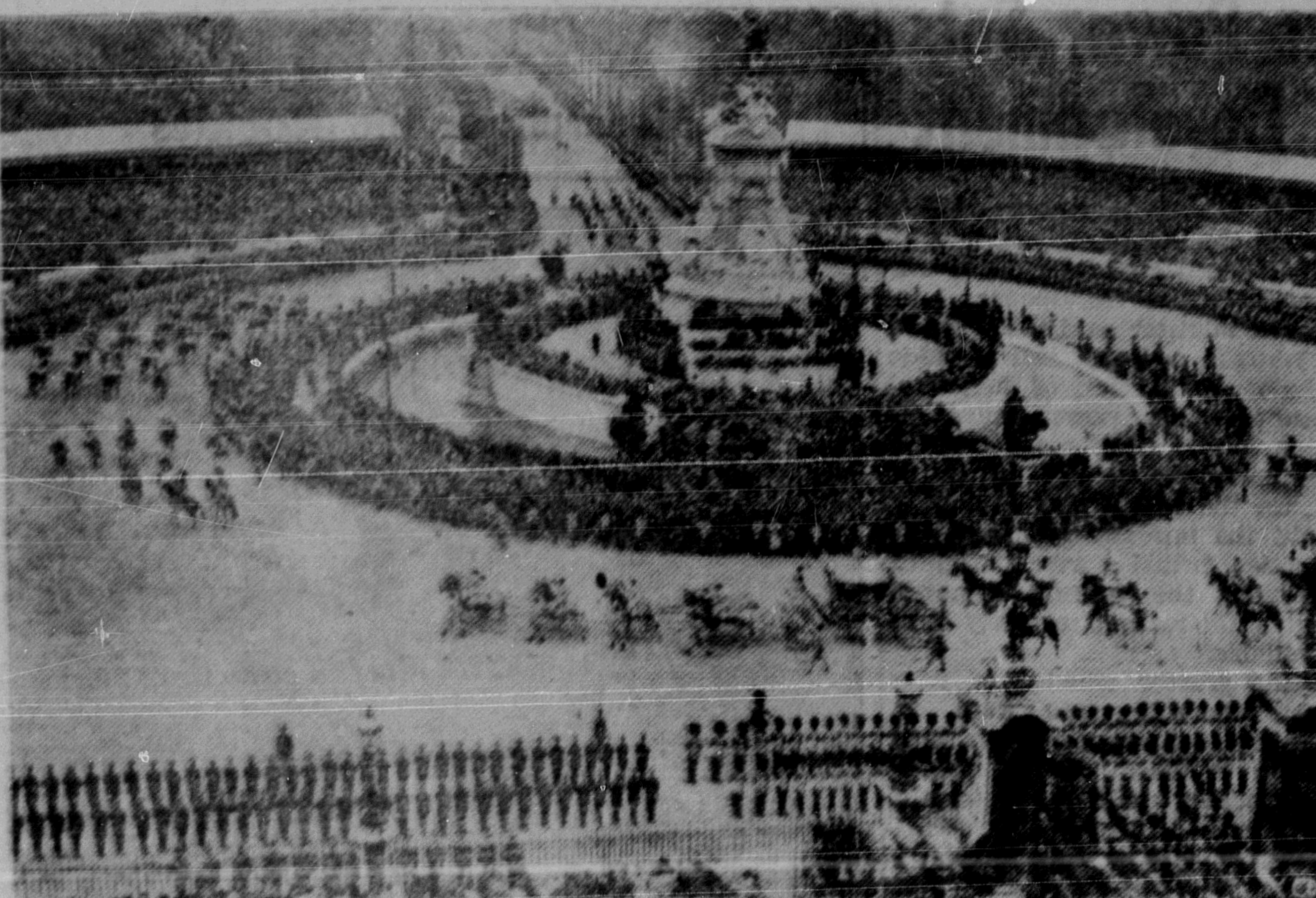

Women Radio Writer Leaves On African Tour

Leaving behind the Hudson's Bay coat, elkskin boots and slacks which she wore on her far-northern adventure over Christmas, Kate Aitken took off for South Africa last week, end with two pastel linen suits, a white lace dinner dress, and a light topcoat. Twelve thousand air miles from Yellowknife, Johannesburg in South Africa is enjoying brilliant summer sunshine.

It's no winter vacation to a southern clime, however, that Canada's "Flying Mrs. A" is taking in South Africa. Never one to sit back in an armchair and gather her broadcast facts, Kate Aitken is in Johannesburg and Nairobi to discover for herself the facts behind South Africa's unrest which is making this Commonwealth partner front-page news the world over.

"The world of western democracy is one world," says Mrs. Aitken. "We are dependent on each other for our existence. We must strive to understand each other, therefore, if we are to adjust our basic differences and exist as if we were one world."

Mrs. Aitken arrived in Johannesburg early Monday morning from London, England. During her four-day stay she will interview Prime Minister Malan and fly up to Nairobi in Kenya colony, centre of bitter native rioting. Not all her attention, however, will be devoted to the country's race problems. As the guest in Johannesburg of one of South Africa's oldest and most colorful residents, she will attend a few of the capital's official social functions. She will also conduct a fact-finding survey of the Union's major industries, also its educational and welfare facilities.

Synthetics To Replace Blood Plasma

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Army is experimenting with substitutes for plasma but officials hasten to stress that the need for blood donors is just as great as ever.

Bill Boss, Canadian Press staff writer with the Canadians in Korea, reports that a synthetic sugar formula called dextran is being tested there as a substitute for plasma in emergency treatment for wounded men.

He said Canadian medical officers in Korea have recommended to headquarters in Ottawa that Canada follow the U.S. Army in replacing plasma with the new life-preserver.

Army headquarters confirmed that both dextran and another chemical synthetic known as PVP which is widely used in Germany and France have been under study, but a senior medical official said they will never be able to replace blood and he doubts that they can replace plasma entirely.

Plasma, dried blood crystals dissolved in a saline solution, has been the standard substitute for whole blood in emergency treatment for some years. It is used to keep up the body fluid content until whole blood can be used.

Dr. G. D. W. Cameron, deputy minister of national health, also stressed that dextran is not a substitute for whole blood and that the need for blood donors in

ICS Teacher Retires After 52 Years

MONTREAL — John Burton Churchill, one of this country's most distinguished and successful educators, has completed 52 years of service to the people of the Dominion. He announced his retirement effective this month as vice-president of International Correspondence Schools Canadian Ltd.

An ex-schoolteacher who was born in Elgin, Ont., in 1878, Mr. Churchill's career has been one of achievement. While others built material monuments in forging Canada's greatness, he specialized in training men.

Commenting on Mr. Churchill's long tenure of service, Lawrence W. Tice, president of the parent company located in Scranton, Penn., said: "For his knowledge of his work and the educational problems and needs of his countrymen, he has long been recognized as an outstanding authority. His loyalty, integrity and sound judgment have long been an inspiration to students, acquaintances and his fellow associates."
