VANCOUVER. - Social Credit appeared today to be marching toward majority government in British Columbia with final success hinging on continued strength in the multiple-seat ridings.

Retaining or leading in the interior seats it captured in 1952, and making inroads for the first time on Vancouver Island, the party now looks to the big city ridings for a working majority in the 48-seat legislature.
