

Gen. Eisenhower Completes First Year As President Free of Personal Abuse

WASHINGTON — When President Eisenhower hopped

out of bed one morning this week and looked in the mirror, he may have thought: "How did

I ever come to let myself in for this?"

He had moved into the White House one year ago. And it had been a tough, grinding year. The face which gazed back at him in the mirror looked a little older. Not much. Just a little.

But if he wondered why he had been willing to carry on his back that mountain called the presidency, it was probably a thought that lasted only an instant.

He was still as jaunty as ever, working harder and longer hours, perhaps, than any he had endured since those days on the eve of the invasion of Normandy, 10 years ago.

He seemed, judging from the quick grin he could produce, to be enjoying his job. He was still enormously popular. And he was still amazingly free from personal abuse.

TOUGHENING ATTITUDE
He was wiser, no doubt, than he had been that day a year ago. In his first year, he frankly concedes, he was a political novice. He doesn't claim political mastery now.

His handling of Congress this year will illustrate his political development, or lack of it. Last year he was mild and gentle with the lawmakers. Some of his critics said he was more anxious to be liked than to lead.

His friends gave another explanation: He was using 1953 to get his program ready for 1954, so there was no reason in 1953 to antagonize legislators whose help he might otherwise get for his program this year.

Toward the end of his first year, Eisenhower gave signs of a toughening attitude, which may be an indication of the mood he'll use in 1954.

Korean Finds Studying Tougher Here

VANCOUVER (CP) — Kun Pak, 27-year-old South Korean Navy veteran, finds it much tougher studying at the University of British Columbia than at Seoul University.

Kun recently arrived here to study for his master's degree in political science. His entry into Canada was sponsored by Bill Boss, Canadian Press correspondent now stationed in Moscow, and Reginald Bowering of Victoria.

"Two hours a day was considered hard study at Seoul University," said Kun who won a degree in philosophy there before being drafted into the Korean Navy. "They expect much work here. The professors are hard drivers, but that's what I need."

Although he speaks English surprisingly well, the language is worrying him somewhat. "I don't always understand what my professors are saying."

Kun says there is great need for young politicians in his country. "Syngman Rhee is an excellent practical politician, but he now is 78 and there must be someone to continue when he dies."

He Talks, but Doesn't Play, Expert Game

The reason Mr. New is usually a kibitzer is that he sounds like an expert but doesn't play like one. He can talk about any angle of the game. But when he is in there, he doesn't recognize the need for plays which are exceptions to the general rules.

For example, he knows something about hold-up plays—cucking the first lead of a suit to gain some kind of an advantage. In this particular hand, ducking the first lead was a distinct disadvantage.

Mr. Masters' opening lead was the six of hearts and Mr. New lost no time playing the trey from the board. If the lead were from a holding headed by king-10 or queen-10, Mr. Dale would win the first heart trick but then dummy's remaining hearts would bottle up the suit very satisfactorily.

Good reasoning, but not applicable to this particular situation. What about the other suits? Specifically, what about the spade suit? Mr. Dale won the first trick with the king of hearts and promptly shifted to a low spade. From there on Mr. New had no chance for his contract.

His ace of spades was knocked out while Mr. Masters still had the ace of diamonds for an entry and the defenders took three spades, a heart and a diamond.

Correct play in this case was to win the first trick with the ace of hearts and shift to a diamond, continuing that suit until the ace was knocked out. At that point it would be extremely unlikely that the defenders could run off four heart tricks—which they would have to do to beat the hand.

When considering holding up in a suit, it pays to check your whole hand to make sure that a switch to a new suit will not prove more embarrassing than the play of the suit opened.
