BROOM AWAY

If you want to get away from a drift delivery or if you want to develop a smooth, effortless swing and follow through in releasing your stone... whether you slide or not... keep your broom off the ice! Only as a last resort to prevent a fall should the broom touch the ice surface and if it happens, the handle of the broom should strike the ice before the straw. Let me list the "don'ts": first Use this as a check list next time you get out on the ice.

(1) Don't hold the broom behind you when you are taking your stance in the hack.  
Why?  
Every player who rides the straw of his broom starts off this way. If you hold your broom straight to your left side with the straw pointing forward, it is impossible for you to ride the broom. It is also almost impossible for you then to drift off the correct line of delivery.

(2) Don't point the straw of the broom down.  
This is another temptation to ride your broom for balance. Hold the broom handle well up the shaft near the shoulder, where it balances easily in your hand. Keep the straw pointed ahead and up a little.  
Sure, it will take practice. Cut down a little on your leg drive and length of slide. Get out on the ice and practice this. Naturally, don't experiment during a scheduled game. Try it in a practice game or on the ice by yourself. Keep at it. Don't quit trying because you can't master it the first day. There are many curling seasons ahead of you, and you will be surprised how easily it will come to you if you persist for a few weeks.

## BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Mr. Abel Is Awed by His Opponents; Fails To Pass

Knowing when to pass made a big difference in today's deal. It could have meant a swing of one thousand points.

Mr. Abel plays pretty well more than half the time. But one of his weaknesses is he is somewhat awed by opponents like Mr. Masters and Mr. Champion. He wouldn't admit this, but when those two reach a contract against him, he secretly considers it good as made.

He had a very poor defensive hand today, and when Mr. Masters bid six hearts, he elected to take a sacrifice at spades, the suit in which his partner had overcalled. Six spades was set four tricks, Mr. Keen losing two spades, a heart and two diamonds.

The 700 point set wouldn't have been so bad if Mr. Masters could have made six hearts. The heart slam would have netted 180 trick points, 500 points for the slam plus the value of the first game.

However, there was no chance for six hearts against a club opening. Mrs. Keen could, have won the first two tricks in clubs and led a third round of the suit for Mr. Abel to ruff. She could have made sure of the club opening lead by doubling six hearts—a conventional double usually calling for a lead in the first suit bid by the eventual dummy.

Thus six hearts could have been defeated 300 points. Instead Mr. Abel's side went down 700, a swing of a thousand.

Mr. Abel would have done much better to raise spades immediately—on the first round of bidding. That would have let Mrs. Keen know that he had a fair dummy for a spade contract. With that knowledge, she could have decided whether to sacrifice at six spades or take some other action.

The way the bidding actually went, Mr. Abel trapped himself—and his partner. The opponents got all the way to the six level before he ever told his partner he could play spades. Poor Mrs. Keen was forced to accept his decision that the sacrifice was in order. Obvious, the decision was no good.

## Russian Painters Must Put Politics First, Art Second

LONDON (Reuters)—The task of the Russian artist is to glorify the Soviet lily—even if he first has to wipe off the mud.  
Working within the framework of "socialist realism," which bars modernist, cubist or impressionist works, he must put politics first, art second.

Since Soviet life must never be painted in drab colors, "reality" sometimes requires retouching.

Because they failed to appreciate this, several Soviet artists have been rapped over the knuckles by the influential periodical, "Culture and Life," published under direction of the Soviet central committee.

One artist titled his canvas "Mother." According to "Culture and Life," he drew a "squalid old woman with a wasted face, painted in green and brown colors, on a dirty brown background."

U. Vassnetsov painted "a chaotic accumulation of black, red and white spots" and called the work "The Little Hump-Backed Horse," after a favorite Russian fairytale "A mockery," said "Culture and Life."

A third artist painted "A Woman in a Grey Fur Coat." The Soviet periodical said he portrayed her face as being "without thought or feeling." It added, "The portrait is painted in dirty yellow shades and evokes a feeling of aversion."

**Police Drive Convicts Back to Cells**  
PITTSBURGH (CP)—Officials at the Western State Penitentiary regained full control of the prison after state police drove convicts back into lockless cells with a volley of shots.

Since the riot ended last Monday, 1,000 prisoners had been roaming their two cellblocks because they had broken locks and cell doors.

A detail of state police, armed with rifles and pistols, entered the cellblocks, fired a warning volley to forestall any possible resistance and ordered the convicts into cells.

## Eleven Killed By German Bomb

BERLIN (CP)—Explosion of a wartime German bomb at a Soviet zone airfield near Berlin killed at least 11 persons including several Russian soldiers and injured more than 20 others.

The blast occurred Wednesday at Oranienburg airfield, 30 miles north of Berlin, during an attempt to defuse the bomb.

## Old Trails

LIMA, Peru (CP)—Explorer Victor von Hagen and his wife have started a two-year exploration of the ancient Inca highway system. They aim to map a vast area between Peru and Ecuador to find how much of the historic system can be tied into the modern Pan-American Highway.
