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Daughter Doesn't Wish To Visit Mother Bergmann

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Ingrid Bergman's 13-year-old daughter, Jenny Ann, doesn't want to visit her mother in Italy this summer, says a psychiatrist who examined the child.

The psychiatrist, Dr. Charles O. Sturdevant, testified yesterday at the trial of Miss Bergman's suit for summer custody of the child. The suit is opposed by the father, Dr. Peter Lindstrom, who divorced Miss Bergman after she bore a child out of wedlock to Italian Director Robert Rossellini.

The girl told him, the psychiatrist said, "If my mother wishes to visit me, she can come to Pennsylvania." Dr. Lindstrom is a neuro-surgeon at a veterans' hospital in Pennsylvania.

Dr. Sturdevant said Jenny Ann expressed an aversion for Rossellini which results from a feeling that this man has taken her mother away.

Producer David O. Selznick says Ingrid Bergman is a fine woman and mother and Roberto Rossellini is a fine father.

Testifying yesterday as a character witness in Miss Bergman's suit to have her daughter, Jenny Ann, 13, visit her in Italy this summer, Selznick said he and his wife, Jennifer Jones, traveled through Italy with the Rossellinis and "there was an extraordinary fine relationship."

Miss Bergman's suit is opposed by her former husband, Dr. Peter Lindstrom, who has testified he does not believe the Rossellini home a proper environment for Jenny Ann.

MONTEREY, Calif. (AP)—The United States Army is going to prosecute a veteran sergeant who wrote Gen. Mark Clark that his handling of a Kofe war prison camp incident was "repugnant and disgraceful."

Sgt. C. Dean Chase, 24, Salt Lake City, was charged yesterday with disrespect to a superior officer and ordered court-martialed. Maximum penalty if convicted is six months in prison and a dishonorable discharge.

Chase commented: "I knew exactly what I was doing" but expected only a reprimand.
