Alaska Growing Rapidly

Population This Year Estimated at 153,900

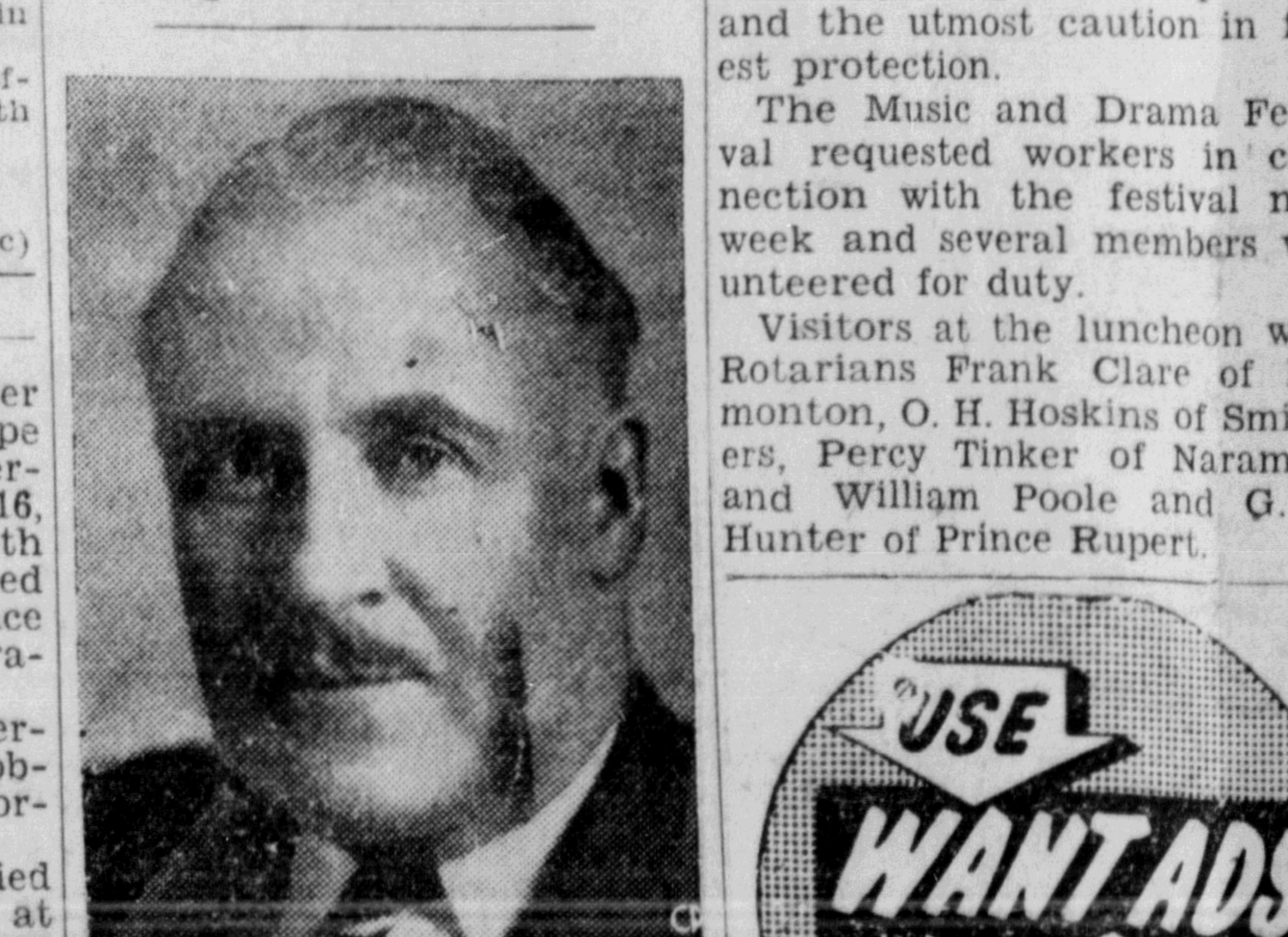
JUNEAU—Alaska continues to be the fastest-growing region under the American flag, its population as of January 1, 1952, being estimated at 153,900, a gain of 20 percent over the 128,643 persons counted in the Territory in the 1950 decennial census, it is announced by Don H. Goodman, Alaska Development Board chairman. The increase over the 1939 official count amounts to 112 percent. Mr. Goodman said.

The estimate is based on passenger traffic data obtained from the various transportation companies operating between the United States, or Canada, and Alaska; Alaska and Haines Highway traffic figures prepared by the Canadian Department of Immigration and vital statistics compiled by the Alaska Department of Health.

The transportation figures, kept on a monthly basis, illustrate clearly the annual ingress and egress of seasonal workers, tourists and others. The peak population during 1950 was reached in July, when there were an estimated 147,800 persons in the Territory. This number dropped to 137,860 by December 31 of that year.

The peak population during 1951 was reached in August, when there were an estimated 165,700 persons in Alaska. The number declined to 159,450 in September, 155,750 in October, reaching 153,900 at the end of December.

The natural increase—births over deaths—totalled 2,473 in 1950 and 3,082 in 1951, a grand total of 5,555. Minor adjustments remaining to be made in the 1951 figures are expected to bring the latter figure to a somewhat higher mark.

An Overtrick Complete the Contract

Mr. Dale's play was the only bright spot in this hand. The bidding was weird and so was the defense. Mr. Muzzy's opening bid was gruesome and might have got his side in a lot of trouble.

Mrs. Keen's bidding was not as reliable as usual. With two honors in hearts, a fair hand and even distribution, she should have responded to her partner's double with one no trump instead of two diamonds. She would have fared very well at that contract.

The best commentary on Mr. Abel's double is that Mr. Dale made his contract with an overtrick.

The opening lead was the eight of hearts. Dummy ducked and Mr. Muzzy won with the queen. After some thought he returned the king of clubs. When Mr. Abel showed interest with the 10 spot, he led a small club which was won with the ace over Mr. Dale's jack.

A third club was returned and Mr. Abel expected his partner to trump. But Mr. Dale won with the queen. He led his deuce of spades and won with dummy's jack when Mr. Abel played low. Spade was led back to the ace and Mr. Muzzy dropped a small heart.

Mr. Dale stopped to count. Mr. Muzzy had started with one spade and three clubs, leaving him nine cards in the red suits. Almost surely he had the queen of diamonds and the king of hearts left. He could hardly have

started with more than five hearts as Mr. Abel should have held three hearts for his raise.

Mr. Muzzy would have to hold two hearts and three diamonds to guard those suits. Six tricks had been played. Mr. Dale could win the next two tricks with top trumps. And the lead of the good club would get everybody down to four cards.

So Mr. Dale cashed his king and queen of spades and led the seven of clubs. Mr. Abel trumped with his last spade—and Mr. Muzzy was squeezed. Dummy's last four cards were the ace and jack in both red suits.

Mr. Muzzy held the king and one heart and three diamonds to the queen. It was his play. He discarded the seven of diamonds. And Mr. Dale took the last three tricks in the diamond suit.

criticism of mayor and aldermen but he did believe that there would be greater efficiency in carrying on city business by the appointment of a full time city manager which, he felt, was to be preferred to the hit-and-miss system of civic government by an elective city council.
