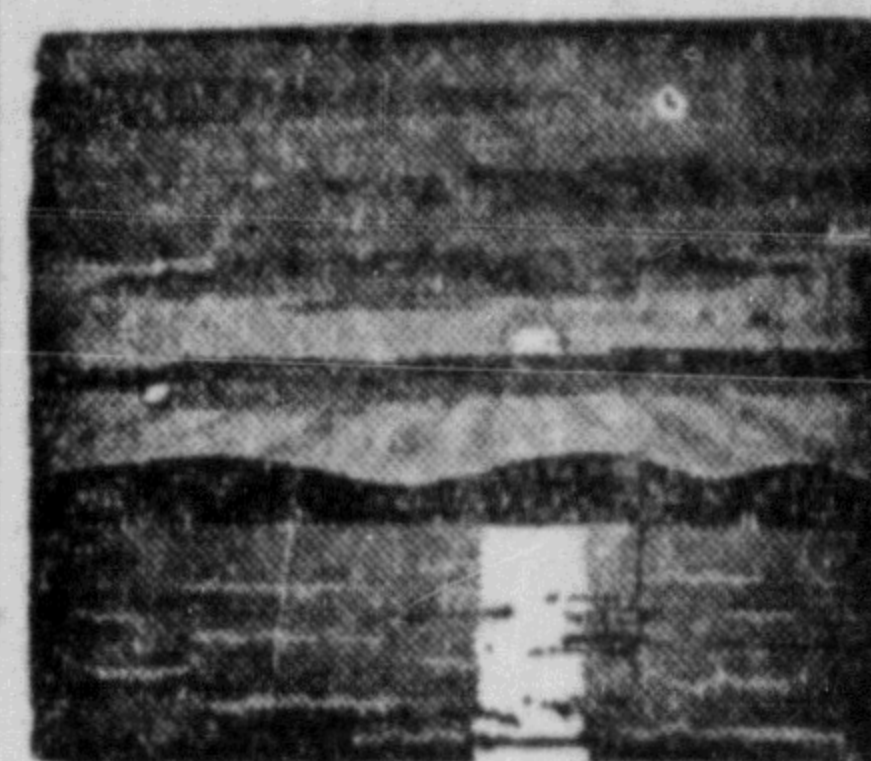

WATERFRONT -- WHIFFS

Waterfront Soon to be Reactivated— Big Tourist Season Expected

While the movement of shipping and scope of fishing activity can certainly be said to have been greater this winter than in some previous seasons, it will be a few more months yet before the volume of traffic on Prince Rupert waterfront begins to approach its peak.

According to recent announcement, deep sea halibut fishing will not get under way until May 20 and, if it is anything like last year, its duration will be brief. But salmon operations will fill the gap. Steamship and railway offices appear confident that tourist travel will rank with the heaviest, this estimate being based on the number of early inquiries and reservations. August is usually the favorite month.

According to H. A. Dunlop, International Halibut Fisheries Commission director, the opening of deep sea fishing next year will be a little later than what it has been other times. For 1953, Mr. Dunlop reports the opening date will be between June 1 and 10, depending on the tides at that time.

The fact of fish meal, produced from herring caught in immense quantities off Prince Rupert and the coast around this seaport, makes of some special interest, data telling about Norwegian exports. Fish meal exports doubled those of the 1950 period and accounted for 58 per cent of the increase in total volume. Britain increased her purchases of fish meal by 110,000,000 pounds, the United States by 22,000,000 pounds and Western Germany by 19,000,000 pounds.

Operation of what is known as the Danish type of floating trawl net is commencing on this coast, a licence having been issued by F. E. Smith, of the federal Department of Fisheries. It will at first be on trial. The catching of herring will be under close observation by an official from the Pacific Biological Station. The net, which is well known on the Atlantic, and is towed by two vessels which may be handled as much as 300 feet apart. This net, instead of being dragged over the floor of the sea, can be set at any depth.

Lining of a ship to be loaded with wheat means almost a week's work. Dozens of carpenters find employment for the lining of say, a ten thousand ton craft is a sizeable job. The labor of lining a British vessel, to carry wheat, it is generally understood is performed by the seamen themselves while at sea. This is more to the shipper's advantage than having the job done in an alien port.

In Ketchikan on Monday next the annual convention of the United Trollers of Alaska will take place. This has been announced by Andrew Barlow. To discuss prices a good many fish buyers, it is expected, will be present. Juneau will be represented by O. G. Nolde, Roger Bailey or Jack Manery. One of the matters to be discussed will be contract revisions.

Commencing in April, passenger liners of the Canadian National Steamships, as well as freight sailings, will run between Montreal, Halifax, Boston, Bermuda, West Indies and British Guiana. The ships on the West Coast with two of them, the Empress of Britain and Empress of Canada, and three on the Atlantic Coast, the Empress of Australia, the Empress of India, the Empress of Japan, the Empress of Korea, the Empress of Manchuria, the Empress of Mexico, the Empress of Persia, the Empress of Siam, the Empress of Sumatra, the Empress of Thailand, the Empress of Tonga, the Empress of Vanuatu, the Empress of Zanzibar.
