

## JUDGE DENIES COUPLE "LUXURY OF DIVORCE"

CHICAGO (P)—Mrs. Alice C. Moore, 30, asked Wednesday temporary alimony to support herself and a daughter, 1, pending a hearing on her divorce suit against Robert Moore, 32.

Moore, questioned by Judge Alan E. Ashcraft, said he earns \$272 a month as a shipping clerk and has fixed expenses of \$150.

"You're too poor to enjoy the luxury of a divorce," Judge Ashcraft told the couple. "You're foolish even to want one. I suggest you become reconciled."

The Moores agreed, and left the courtroom hand in hand.

## Kitimat Housing Story Incorrect Asserts MLA

Recent feature in a Vancouver newspaper on housing in Kitimat has been branded by MLA Frank Howard as a false impression.

Howard informed the Daily News today that there were no complaints in Kitimat of the houses, contrary to the newspaper's report that Alcan president McNeely Dubose denied that there were criticisms of the complaints, said Howard, were that double-

paned windows were incorrectly installed and steamed up badly, the French windows leading out of some living rooms were "a joke, of such flimsy construction that they could not keep the cold out. There were no basements and the oil heaters installed were the cheapest on the market, too noisy and burning too much oil for the heat they provided. Floors were of rubber tile installed directly over concrete and perpetually cold.

In conclusion, Mr. Howard said "If Mr. Dubose would interview his employees as a sensible employer should and not rely upon information from his subordinates in Kitimat, he would know what is behind the scenes in Kitimat. . . . Alcan is generating a bad name for itself and allowing the homes for their workers to be built in a neat-sketch, haphazard atmosphere."

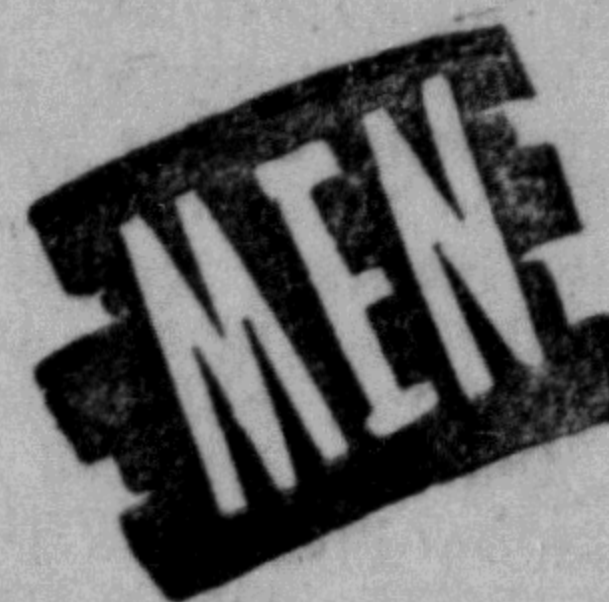
