

Graduating Class at Booth Honored Attractive, Formal Ceremony

An attractive and quietly conducted ceremony, 46 members of the graduating class at Memorial High School honored last night before a full audience that filled the spacious auditorium. It was estimated that more than 100 were present.

At the occasion was presentation of bursaries, honors going to five girls and boys. Armida Toffoli, a girl who has completed her course in three years, one of them being con-

ducted by correspondence from Stewart, received special recognition by winning two of the six bursaries offered.

Winner of the IODE's \$100 bursary for general proficiency, presented by Mrs. Jack Flood, was Paul Antrobus. Two wards of \$150 each offered by the Parent-Teacher Association for students going on to Normal School went to Armida Toffoli and Joan Smith, with the presentation being made by Mrs. Peter Mark. Miss Smith is a graduate of last year's class.

On behalf of the registered nurses, Mrs. Neil Stromdahl presented to Donna Petroff the \$100 bursary for the student adjudged the most suitable to continue on to nursing school. The Soreptimist Club's bursary of \$100 for the girl in university entrance showing the most general proficiency went to Armida Toffoli, with Miss Elizabeth Clement making the presentation.

Norma MacKay, who was also class valedictorian, received from Mrs. F. E. Anfield the \$100 bursary donated by the Women's Canadian Club to the student showing most aptitude in the English arts. An award of \$25 was given by Mrs. Chris Worsley on behalf of the Business and Professional Women's

Club to Yoshiko Matsuo for attaining the highest standing among students in commercial studies.

In her valedictory address, Miss MacKay spoke of the value of team-spirit in life at school. "Students do not choose their classmates but experience soon teaches that each student has a different personality, that friendship comes with co-operation and that companionship is fostered by team-spirit," she said. "This parting comes just when we feel we can really appreciate one another and we know we have made life-long friends."

Miss MacKay expressed thanks to school board members for their work in having the school enlarged and improved. She also thanked the ratepayers for making the new building possible.

"The world believes the next generation belongs to Canada," she concluded. "We are this generation. It is up to us to prove equal to the faith the world has in us."

With school principal A. M. Hurst as chairman, greetings from the school board were expressed by Dr. R. G. Large. A message from the department of education was given by G. W. Graham who saw the graduation as the addition of a "fine quota of citizens" to society.

Guest speaker at the occasion was J. F. Magor who expressed belief that the students were making their start in this part of the country.

"Here where the forests reach almost to our doorstep and the horizons of the sea lie open before us, there is adventure and opportunity and promise which make it almost impossible to do anything dull or worthless," he said. "This immediate area of mountains, rivers and oceans is Canada in the truest and most exciting meaning of the word, and no one can say what astonishing events the future may hold."

Mr. Magor pointed to the efforts of families, teachers and those who have built the country in making the students' education possible.

"In addition to your own efforts, there is the toil and sacrifice of many others, and that is the way life is," he said. "We are never really alone, never independent of others. We may guide our fate but we can never be absolute masters of it. It is good that this is so because without the unexpected, much of the richness and thrill of life would be gone."
