**Never-Say-Die Penticton Downs Sudbury to Win Cup**

PENTICTON, B.C. (CP)—There was dancing in the streets until dawn here Sunday, as the whole city turned out to whoop it up over Penticton V's amazing Allan Cup victory.

The come-from-behind V's took the measure of the dogged Sudbury Wolves 3-2 Saturday night in the seventh and deciding game, to bring the Canadian senior amateur hockey championship to British Columbia for the first time since 1938.

It was a fitting climax to one of the most exciting Allan Cup finals on record.

Sudbury appeared to have the battered trophy in the bag after taking three of the first four games, the fourth one by a convincing 8-2 margin.

But the V's were not to be stopped. In true storybook fashion, they roared back with three straight wins, all of them thrillers.

They rewrote the script slightly Saturday, taking a 3-0 lead and then hanging on grimly as Sudbury stormed back.

Playing-coach Grant Warwick once again was the sparkplug as he fired the winning goal in the second period. Jim Fairburn and Jack McDonald were the other Penticton marksmen, and defenceman Yogi Kraiger and Tatter McClellan scored for Sudbury.

V's led 1-0 at the end of the first period on Fairburn's tally at 15:12. Grant Warwick and rearguard Kevin (Crusher) Conway drew the assists.

Each team scored twice in the second period. V's got both their goals in the first seven minutes and appeared well on the way to victory.

A cross-checking penalty to Penticton's Doug Kilburn at 16:32 set the stage for Wolves comeback. The easterners ganged to the attack and Kraiger connected first at 17:01. McClellan's goal came just 20 seconds later.

Great goal-tending by Ivan McLelland, who performed near miracles for V's all through the playoffs, was the key to the scoreless third period.

**Bantamweight Champion Quits**

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—Australia's Jimmy Carruthers, undefeated bantamweight champion of the world, announced his retirement from boxing Sunday night.

The 24-year-old, 118-pound titlist scored his 19th victory last May 2 when he outpointed Chamreon Songkitrat of Thailand in a 15-round title bout in Bangkok, May 2.

Since turning pro on Aug. 15, 1950, Carruthers won 11 bouts by knockouts and eight by decision.

**Patched-Up Ted Williams Hitting at .727 Clip In First Full Day's Work Against Rampaging Tigers**

Poor old Ted Williams. With a steel pin in his left shoulder and sharp pain torturing his body every time he swings hard, the lanky Boston Red Sox slugger is hitting only .727 after one full day's work. Wait 'til the man gets his strength back.

"I've had better days," said Williams Sunday after smashing eight hits in nine times at bat in a doubleheader at Detroit—a performance, that may well be the big story of 1954. "It hurts like hell every time I swing."

Although Williams got into a game at Baltimore Saturday as a pinch hitter and finished in left field, going hitless in two trips, this was his first real test since he broke his collarbone.

**MADE 'EM WONDER**

Those who saw him hit two homers, a double and five singles and drive in seven runs at Detroit wondered how he did it.

The Red Sox still lost both games 7-6 and 9-8 in 14 innings as the Boston pitchers gave up 27 hits.

Cleveland seized the American League lead by 10 percentage points over Chicago by knocking off Philadelphia twice, 12-7 and 6-0 with Mike Garcia allowing only one hit in the second game, a fourth-inning single by Joe Demastra.

It was the third one-hit game in the majors within a week and the eighth of the season.

Chicago slid out of the lead by dividing a pair with Washington. The White Sox won the first 10-5 with Minnie Minoso driving home six runs but bowed to Washington's capable Bob Porterfield in the 3-1 second game.

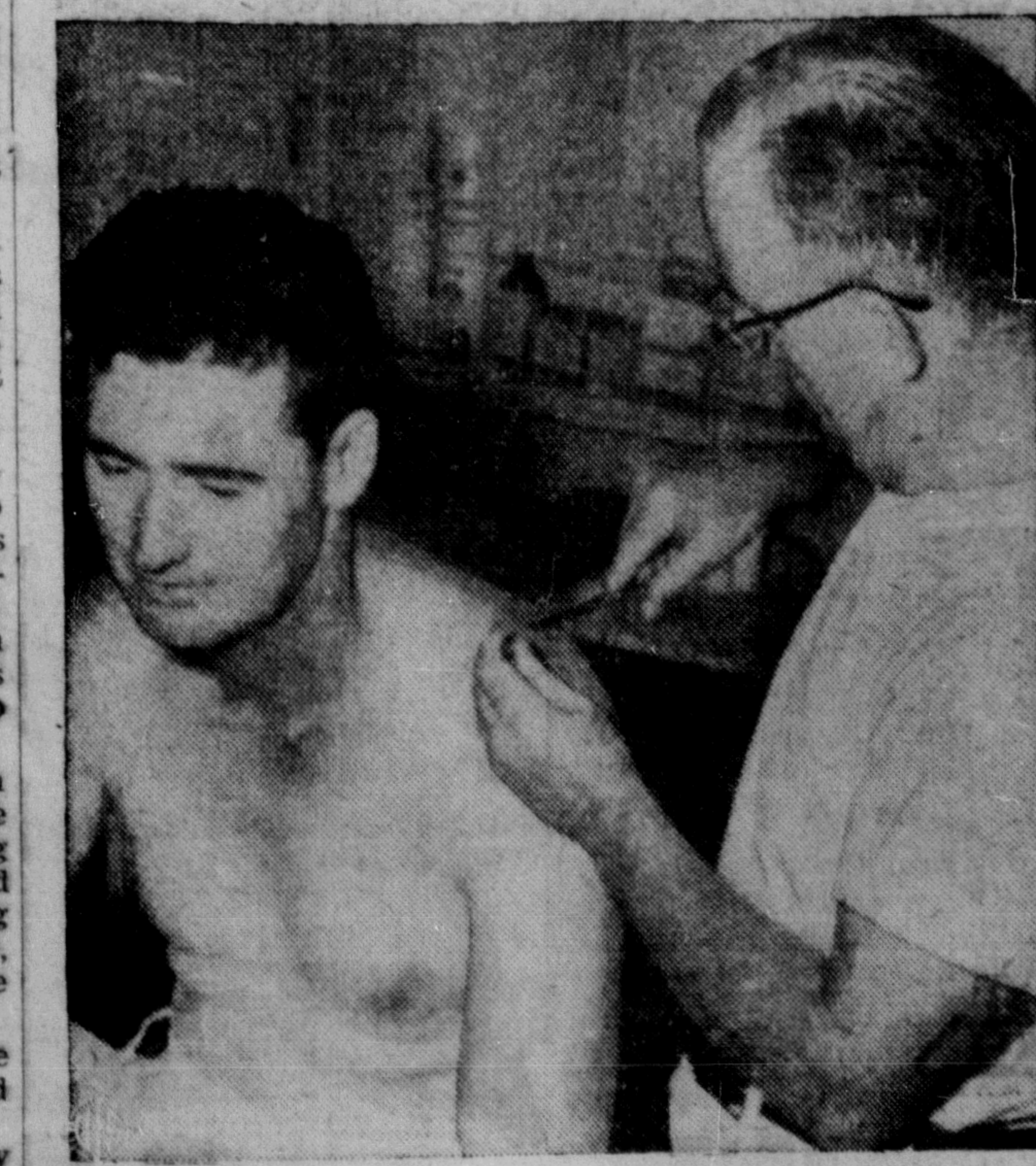
