BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Failure To Analyze Play Can Beat Sound Contract

I have suggested that the memorizing of a long list of safety plays applying to many different combinations of cards is not the best way to become a "safety expert." That method is both tedious and confusing.

A better way is simply to be alert to the possibility of such plays and to reason each one out as it comes up.

Mr. Abel failed to do the necessary reasoning in today's deal and lost his contract. I like his four heart bid on the second round. It was unlikely that Mr. Dale had a singleton heart. Give him two hearts and there was a pretty fair chance that the heart losers could be limited to two. And there weren't many losers in the side suits.

Too bad the play wasn't as good as the bidding. Mrs. Keen led the jack of diamonds and Mr. Abel won with the king. He played the 10 of hearts in an effort, as he said later, to "get a cover."

When Mrs. Keen played the jack, he went up with the king in dummy and saw it smothered with the ace. With the queen-eight over the nine-seven, Mrs. Keen now had two additional trump winners and these, with the ace of clubs, defeated the contract.

Mr. Abel should have reasoned as follows: On the bidding, it was clear that Mr. Champion had a strong hand. Therefore, the odds were overwhelming that he held the ace of hearts. Now, if he had all four outstanding hearts or if he had A Q J alone, the contract was hopeless and no play would make any difference.

If he held the ace and any one other heart, again it would make no difference, how Mr. Abel played. All even so far. But what if he held the ace

alone? In that case it was vital for Mr. Abel to retain his king in dummy. The best play, then, was to lead a low heart at trick two and play the deuce from the board. As you see, this would have held the heart losers to two and made the bid.
