Although many persons insist that sex and violence are topics which create best-sellers, the alltime hard cover best-selleraside from the bible-published in the United States was Charles Sheldon's "In His Steps," a book with an inspirational religious

In a half-century, "In His Steps" is estimated to have sold at least 8,000,000 copies. Ironically, Sheldon a clergyman, never copyrighted his book and never realized any great financial return from it.




