Mr. Kidd was succeeded by Rev. A. M. Ross who had formerly bee nmissionary at Atlin. After Mr. Ross's departure the congregation extended a call to Rev. F. W. Kerr who was then taking postgraduate work in Marburg, Germany. Mr. Kerr accepted the call and was the first inducted minister of the Presbyterian Church in Prince Rupert.

STRANGE APPEARANCE

In a letter written some years later from Montreal, Prof. Kerr wrote: "Prince Rupert presented strange appearance in those days and blasting operations took place all the years of my ministry, in order to make the crooked places straight and the rough places plain. I have never known people with greater courage and optimism than those men of the early days. Everyone was brimming with happiness. Lots were selling rapidly and we were laying plans for a second Vancouver. The Presbyterians met in a hall but soon this became inadequate so that during my entire ministry we rented the theatre (Empress) for Sunday evenings. At the request of the managers one Sunday I announced that we would have a bee on Monday night to tear down the old hall in order that the lumber might be transported to our new site. It seemed to me as if hundreds of men were there and in the course of a couple of hours the entire hall was taken to pieces, the boards carried up the plank road and the next day hauled out to the site of the present church. Another thing that I remember vividly was my arrival in Prince Rupert with my bride, two years after my first arrival. As the boat came slowly into the wharf I thought I saw every Presbterian down there to welcome us. D. C. McRae took snaps of that occasion and I keep them

among my treasures." During Mr. Kerr's ministry the town had a rapid growth of population and the church soon became self sustaining. Dr. H. R. Grant writing of Mr. Kerr stated: "He was a very popular minister and a brilliant preacher and the congregation sustained a distinct loss when he went to New Westminster in


