

First May Dance Since Independence Marked With Wild Violence

TOKYO (CP) - Twenty thousand Communist-led anti-American rioters today fought police with clubs and stones in

front of the Imperial Palace. United States troops armed with machine guns, fanned out through the city to protect foreign lives and property in the worst riots in Japan since the end of the Second World War.

The tumultuous May Day demonstration came only three days after Japan formally regained her independence.

Americans were attacked, tried unsuccessfully to pry out stoned and mauled. But none were seriously hurt.
