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Steel Plants Back Under Gov't Seizure

Workers Still Away From Their Jobs Today

WASHINGTON, D.C. (Canadian Press)—The United States government had the steel industry back under federal seizure today but it remained an open question whether Philip Murray's striking CIO steel workers would return to work.

World's May Day Rough

WASHINGTON (C)—Riots, strikes and rival demonstrations by Communists and non-Communists flared around the world this May Day as workers of the world—far from united—showed their colors and shouted their creeds in cold war.

It was considered at least possible that the government might seek to lure 650,000 strikers back to their jobs by giving them the pay increase which Murray had tried unsuccessfully to pry out of the steel firms.

Murray withheld comment but government lawyers, in getting the federal appeal court last night to restore President Truman's seizure temporarily, said they may have to seek a back-to-court injunction against the United Steel Workers of America.

The United States Court of Appeal today denied the plea of the steel companies that the government be barred from increasing wages while the mills are under government control. The vote was 5 to 4.

Stalin Hurls Germ Charge

MOSCOW (C)—Premier Stalin, looking much as usual today, reviewed the annual May Day parade of Russian labor and armed might from Lenin's marble tomb and heard one of his marshals publicly accuse the United States of germ warfare in Korea and China. The 72-year-old Soviet leader halted once on his way up the long flight of steps, waving to the Russian spectators and foreign diplomats looking up at him from the sunlit stands.

Marshal Leonid Govorov, wartime commander of the Leningrad army, in an anti-western speech to the troops massed in Red Square said:
"In mockery of international agreements, American barbarians are carrying out the greatest crime against humanity—making use of bacteriological weapons in Korea and China."

Reds Riot In Japan

First May Dance Since Independence Marked With Wild Violence
TOKYO (C)—Twenty thousand Communist-led anti-American rioters today fought police with clubs and stones in front of the Imperial Palace.

The tumultuous May Day demonstration came only three days after Japan formally regained her independence.
Americans were attacked, stoned and mauled. But none were seriously hurt.

Club-swinging rioters charged 1000 steel-helmeted police. They clubbed 218 officers to the ground, injuring 51 seriously. Each time the police beat back the human waves with tear gas, clubs and guns.

Lowering Of Fish Tariff

VANCOUVER (C)—A plea for reduction in tariffs to aid the Canadian fishing industry was made on Wednesday by Hon. R. W. Mayhew, minister of fisheries.

Addressing the Fisheries Council convention he said it was recognized that consumption of 10 or 11 pounds of fish by each person in Canada was too small to support the industry.
"The protein value in fish is something we need in our diet," he said.

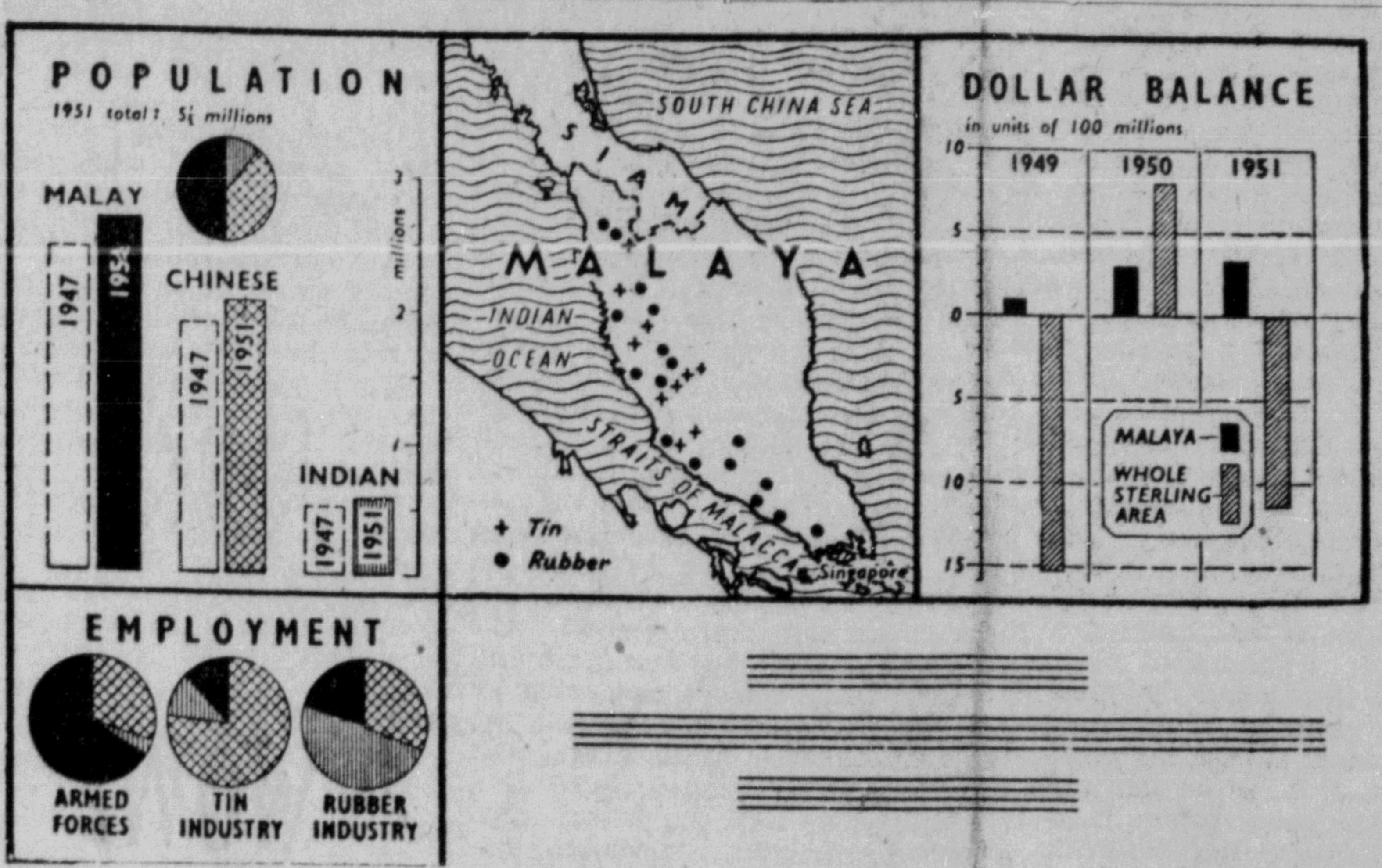
Sixty Boats Heading Out as New Agreement Becomes Operative

Conservative Platform

Announcement of Co-insurance, Non-Sectarian Schools, Forest Management Review Promised
VANCOUVER (Canadian Press)—A new plan for government hospital insurance on non-compulsory non-monopolistic basis with elimination of co-insurance was proposed yesterday in a 12-point platform presented to the Progressive Conservative party convention here.

The platform, presented for approval of 250 convention delegates said:
"We recognize the widespread dissatisfaction with the hospital insurance service as presently carried on in the province."
The platform also pledges a review of school finances and affirms the party "belief in a democratic system of non-sectarian schools as at present established by law in British Columbia."

The platform also pledges reduction by 30 per cent in the cost of licence fees on all passenger automobiles.
Other planks call for the appointment of a commission of inquiry to review the present forest management policy, extension of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway into Vancouver "with the final object in view of extending the railway from Prince George into the Peace River area."
