THE EXPERTS Say...

BUYING IN QUANTITY is one way to keep the cost of living down, says an official of the 15,000-member Hadassah organization of "Canada."

In the opinion of Mrs. M. A. Bregman of Winnipeg, secretary of the 35-year-old association, it also is wise to use fresh fruits and vegetables in-season.

"Hamburger or other chopped meats goes much farther when a little cereal is added such as cream of wheat, corn flakes or bread crumbs," says Mrs. Bregman. "Instead of serving straight fillets, fish balls made from the fillets also go much farther."

She also has found it pays to check the household electrical equipment at regular intervals, rather than wait until something goes wrong and then have to pay heavy repair bills.

ECONOMICAL AND TASTY—Among Mrs. Bregman's favorite recipes is one for apple and raisin pudding which is both easy to make and inexpensive.

Ingredients: One cup brown sugar; one-third cup butter or cooking fat; three-quarters cup flour.

Mix as for pie and add raisins and five-sixths of a cup of finely sliced apples.

Mix and bake in covered dish in hot oven for one-half hour. Mix through and continue baking until well-browned (350 degrees Fahrenheit). The second baking will take approximately another hour.

Raisin cake is another favorite with Mrs. Bregman.

Ingredients: One cup raisins; one-half cup cooking oil; one-half cup white sugar; two eggs; two teaspoons baking-powder; one teaspoon vanilla.

Wash raisins and pour one cup of boiling water over them. Boil for a few minutes. Remove from stove and add baking-soda. Allow to cool.

Separate the eggs and cream yolks with sugar. Add oil and the cooled mixture of raisins. Add cherries if desired. Add flour, vanilla and egg whites which have been well whipped. Bake in an oven of 350 degrees Fahrenheit for three-quarters of an hour. Use a baking-pan 12 by eight inches.

Mr. Champion Is Squeezed and He Knows It

Mr. Muzzy winced a little when Miss Brash went all the way to six no trump. "I don't see why you had to bid six," he said. "When I JUMP to a game, that's a shutout bid!"

This ridiculous statement irked Mr. Champion so much he almost led out of turn. But the fireworks were just starting. Mr. Abel laid down the king of clubs and Mr. Muzzy intended to win with the ace. However, he was still grousing about the bidding and inadvertently played the eight spot.

Immediately, he grabbed up his card, claiming there was so much talk going on that he didn't see what was led. Most of the talk was being done by him. Finally he was convinced the eight of clubs had to stand. Thoroughly confused now, he won the next trick, killing the queen of clubs with the ace. He cashed the king and ace of hearts, planning to try and break that suit 3-3. Just in time he remembered he had already lost a trick.

Next, he cashed his five spade tricks, throwing two hearts and the last club from the board. On the last spade, Mr. Champion was down to his original four diamonds and the queen of hearts. He was squeezed and he knew it. Disgustedly he threw away the heart and, amazingly enough, Mr. Muzzy played his good five of hearts and won the last three tricks with top diamonds.

Mr. Muzzy's play to the first trick was the only one to make the contract. Try to make 12 tricks on the hand, winning the first trick with the ace of clubs.

Mr. Champion would have played the deal the same way Mr. Muzzy did. But he would have known what he was doing.

After the king of clubs was led he would have figured this way: "I have 11 winners, one short of my contract. If one opponent holds his side's only stoppers in the red suits, he can be squeezed. Holding the third best heart and the fourth best diamond he would have to hold seven cards."

"To get him below that I would have to play out seven tricks in the black suits. But I have only six winners in spades and clubs. Therefore it is necessary to lose the first trick. That first trick plus my six black suit winners will enable me to bring my opponent down to six cards—and that will be his ruin."

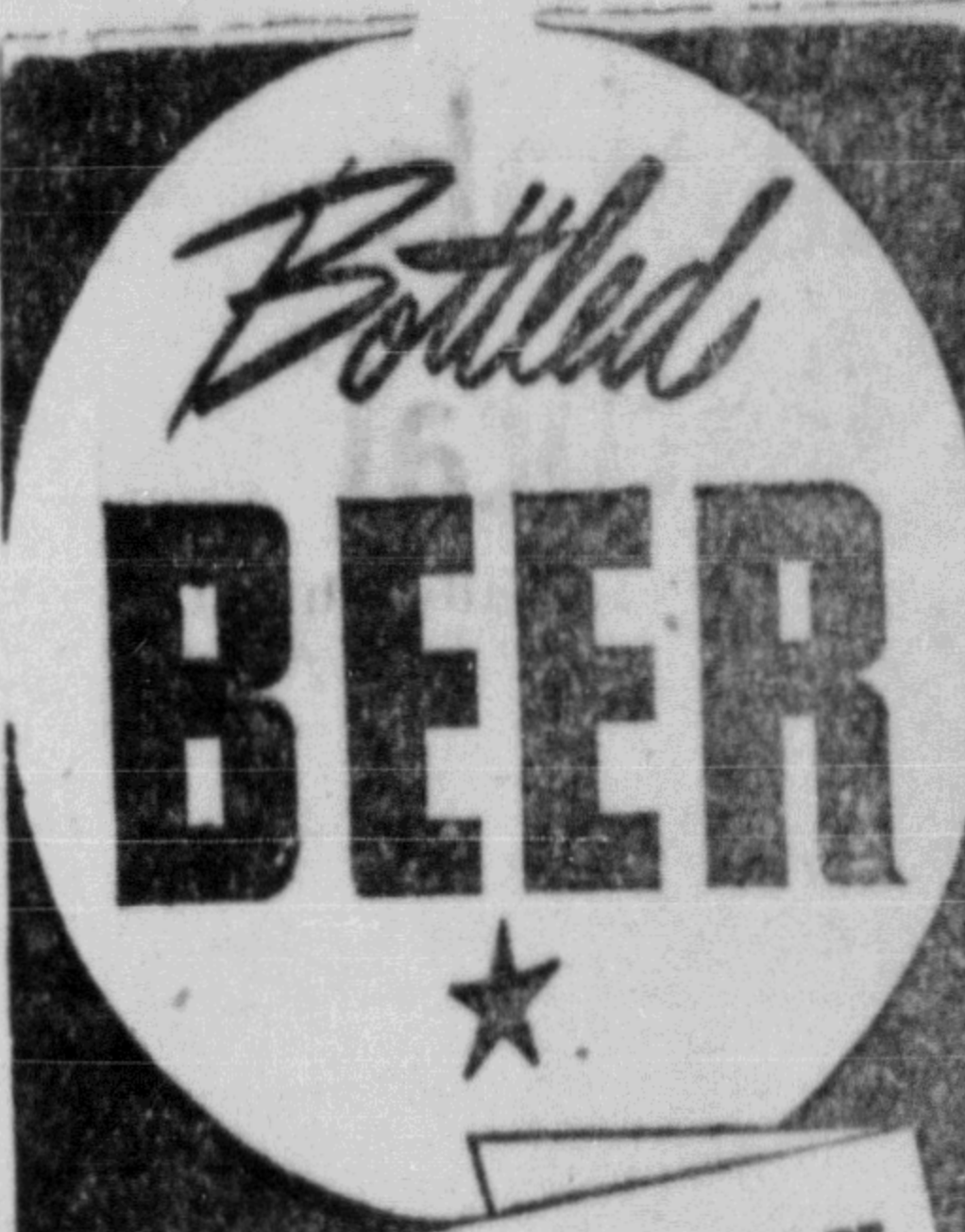
