

Rupert Trapshooters Take All Prizes In First Inter-Club Competition Here

Prince Rupert trap shooters won all events from visiting Terrace teams at the first inter-club competition staged on the new range here by the two Rod and Gun clubs.

Rupert No. 1 team defeated Terrace No. 1 80-62 out of a possible 125 each. Rupert No. 2 defeated Terrace No. 2 58-48.

Most outstanding performance however, came in the individual competition won by Prince Rupert's youthful crack shot Tommy Boulter, jr., against Jack Williams, game warden of Terrace.

Both tied in the team events, each with 20 dead clays out of a possible 25.

In the first round of 15 shots, each scored 13 and were tied again. The 10-round shoot-off was run in two series of five. In the first series, both Williams and Boulter scored perfectly. In the second series, Williams missed one clay while Boulter broke them all to the cheers of many spectators which included Game Commissioner James Cunningham.

Mr. Cunningham was present to attend the annual Rupert Rod & Gun Club game dinner and dance which followed in the evening.

At the salmon-elk-moose dinner, a special occasion was marked with presentation of a life membership in the Rupert Rod & Gun Club to its president, Jim Bacon.

Harold Thom, vice-president, made the presentation of a huge scroll on which were inscribed the following words:

"Whereas we recognize your energy and perseverance in the activities of this club of which you have been a member and officer since its formation some 35 years ago.

"Whereas we honor your understanding in foreseeing the problems familiar to this district relating to wildlife and your fellow sportsmen,

"Be it resolved that this life membership be presented to Mr. and Mrs. B. J. Bacon in acknowledgement of these facts. Therefore we do hereby set our hand, this 25th day of February, 1953."

Game Commissioner Cunningham told the 150 sportsmen and ladies attending the dinner that this year, anyway, the past government's allotment of 75 per cent of game licence revenue to the game commission was not changed.

"In fact, the government has seen fit to grant a little more," said Mr. Cunningham. He encouraged formation of such con-

servation organizations as Rod & Gun Clubs. The Prince Rupert zone now has five, including its own, and one each at Terrace, Kitimat, Port Edward, and on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

"It is up to organizations such as yourselves to play a big part in conservation of our fish and game by showing the commission what likely should be done and by pressing for funds to get these things done," said Mr. Cunningham.

The game commissioner showed several interesting outdoor and wildlife films, which includ-

ed one of a trip he made recently from Vancouver to the Haines "Cut-off" in Alaska, travelling via the Cariboo, Hart and Alaska highways.

In his commentary and by pictures, Mr. Cunningham demonstrated that the Hart and the Alaska highway both "are very good roads. I can recommend them to tourists and sportsmen anywhere."

Entertainment was provided in song by Dyke McMillan, Libby Kelly, Beryl Karasoski. Dancing was enjoyed to music by Robert Wood with accordion and Mr. McMillan at the piano.

All City P-TA Groups Back Proposal to Award Bursary

All four of the local Parent-Teacher Associations pledged their moral and financial support to a scheme instituted by the Prince Rupert Parent-Teacher Council whereby a bursary will be awarded to one high school student desiring to enter teacher's training.

This was disclosed at the monthly meeting of the P-T Council.

Representatives from each P-TA brought news that the plan for the bursary had been warmly received by their members and each P-TA is now making its own arrangements to provide the money.

The bursary will not necessarily be awarded on the basis of scholastic standing. P-T council members decided, but will go to the student whom it is felt will make the best teacher.
