

Red Sox Best Senators And Break Weather Jinx

Boston Red Sox could feel a little easier today about picking up their pay. They knew they were back working for a living. When the Bostonians outlasted Washington 7-6 Friday night it marked their first victory in two weeks and their first official game of any kind since a week ago today. Bad weather has caused eight postponements in Boston so far.

The victory lifted the Red Sox out of the American League cellar over Baltimore into seventh place. Sammy White's homer in the third inning helped Boston to take the lead and the Senators just failed to catch up.

Cincinnati took over first place from Philadelphia in the National League. The Redlegs swamped St. Louis while the Phils were

bowling to Brooklyn 3-1. Chicago beat Milwaukee 3-0. The New York Giants were rained out at Pittsburgh.

YANKS WIN

In the only other American League action the New York Yankees won their second straight shutout, this one by Tom Morgan, as they beat Philadelphia 2-0 on successive home runs in the seventh by Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra. The shutout was Morgan's second, both over the Athletics.

A three-run home run by Hobie Landrith capped a five-run spree for the Reds against Gerry Staley in the second inning at Cincinnati. In the seventh inning Landrith and Johnny Temple worked a double steal with Temple swiping home for the third time this season.

Don Newcombe called a halt to the Phillies' six-game winning streak.

Warren Hacker turned in the Chicago shutout in his first starting assignment of the season. He allowed five hits including three doubles. The Cubs scored their three runs on six singles off Bob Buhl in the first six innings.

Sudbury Unimpressed by Warwicks Down Penticton 3-1 in Kelowna

PENTICTON, B. C. — Sudbury Wolves, unimpressed by Penticton V's Warwick brother trio, will be at the door here tonight in the fourth game of the Allan Cup finals.

If Wolves treat the Penticton stronghold with as little ceremony as they did on the last visit, the V's will face an uphill climb for the title.

Wolves took a 2-1 lead in the best-of-seven series by winning 3-1 in Kelowna Friday night. They also won the first game in Penticton 2-1 and the V's bounced hard enough from that to win the next 6-2.

While Sudbury seems to thrive on the winning and dining provided them as they tour the Okanagan on the Allan Cup agenda, Penticton appears caught up in their own "manana" climate.

Just in case the fever pitch which grips this town shows any signs of abating for tonight's clash, the weather office has promised an overnight low of 43 and a midday high of 75.

Sudbury clicked all the way down the line whipping V's Friday. Lennie Speck put the Wolves into a 1-0 lead in the first period and Tatter McLennan prompted a second marker early in the second.
