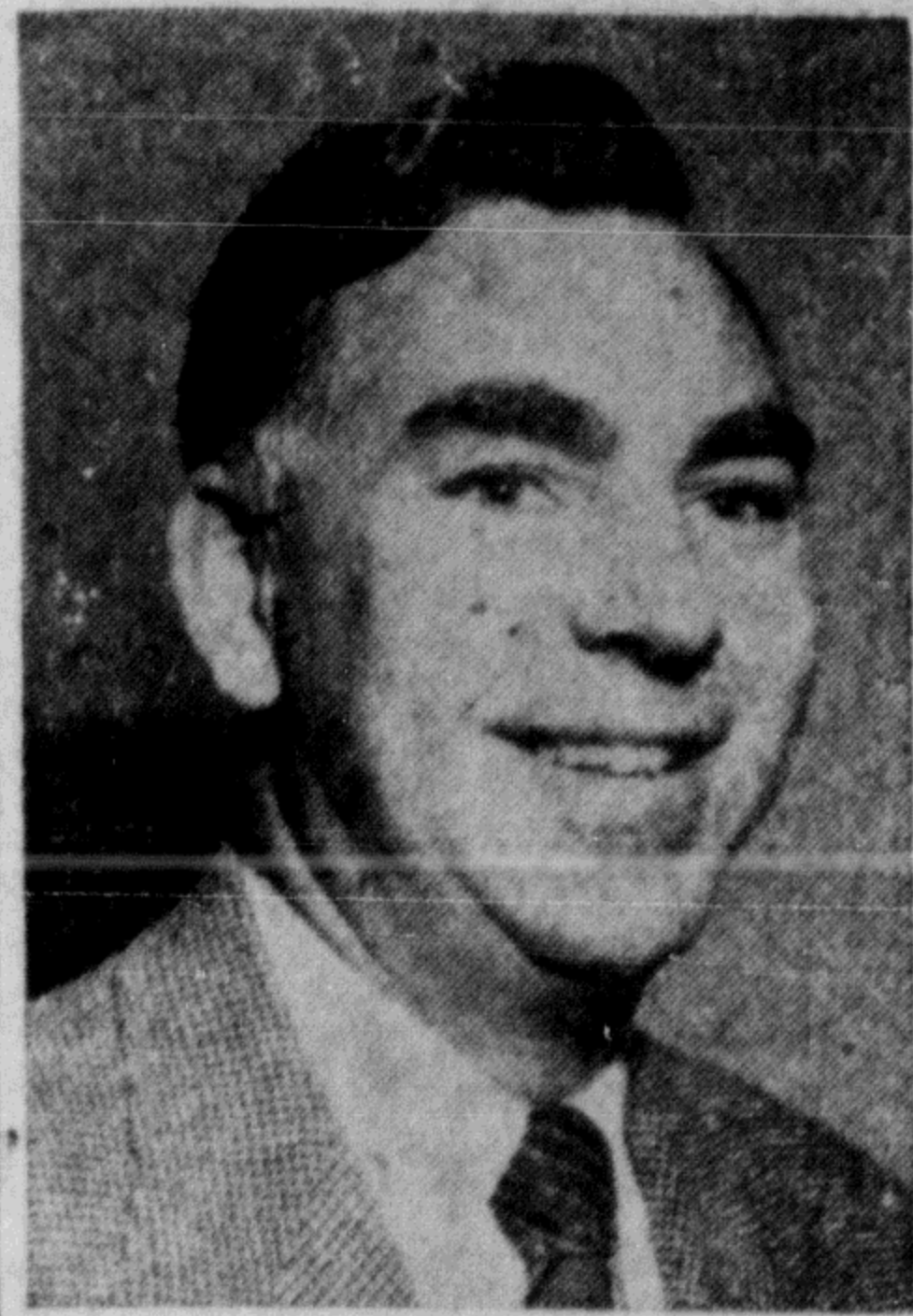

Main part of the inspection was a rigid scrutiny by the visiting party of reserve personnel and the Sea Cadets in "Chatham's" drill hall. No detail was missed by Captain Budge as he passed through the ranks, joking, advising and admonishing in turn.

Following the drill-hall inspection the divisions moved off from the "Chatham" for a march past the reviewing stand located at the Court House. In the reviewing party besides the visitors were Cmdr. T. A. Johnston, Lt. Cmdr. James Pearson, Lt. Fred Freeman and Lt. A. H. Ogilvie.

Scores of Prince Rupert citizens lined the streets and sat in cars at the approaches to the Court house to watch the parade.

Leading the divisions was Battalion Commander Lt. Cmdr. James Foster, followed by the guard under Sub/Lt. Tom Naka. Third in line came the 28 member band, rated the largest naval reserve band in western Canada, under the baton of PO Peter Lien.

The officers' division was led by Lt. Dick Wilson and the Seamen's division by Lt. Roy Berryman. The smartly turned out Wren division was headed by Sub/Lt. Diane Kennedy.

Lt. S. E. Alexander, Company Commander of the Sea Cadets led "B" company with Lt. Edward Daves at the head of No. 1 Platoon and Sub/Lt. G. P. Woodside leading No. 2 Platoon.

Following the march past, Captain Budge returned to the drill hall for an inspection of the Sea Cadets engaged in training in gunnery, seamanship, breeches buoy, rigging tackle and signals.

The inspecting officer surprised one cadet by taking signal flags from him and sending the message "Are you going ashore?" to an even more startled cadet across the hall.

Captain Budge complimented the cadets on their turnout, paying special tribute to their self control.

"Self control is the basis of discipline," he remarked. "When I inspect, I inspect."

"Your standard of dress is good," The inspecting team is expected to complete its annual tour of naval installations by the end of the month, at which time they will return east for a comparison of notes with a similar team, at present inspecting eastern units.

On this comparison the Naval Divisions Efficiency Trophy will be awarded.

\$250 UBC Scholarship Open To Northern B.C. Students

A new \$250 entrance scholarship to the University of British Columbia will be offered to students in the northern areas of British Columbia, was announced today by the Board of Governors and Senate of the University.

The scholarship, which will be awarded to students entering the School of Commerce from Senior Matriculation or first year Arts, was presented to the University by A. P. Gardner and Company of Vancouver.

Students whose homes are in the area of B.C. bounded by a line drawn west from Clinton to the coast and north from Clinton to the straight boundary of the province and then along that boundary to the northern limit of the province will be eligible for the scholarship.

Applicants will be considered on the basis of scholastic standing, aptitude and personal qualities and also financial circumstances and records of part time employment in any phase of commerce or industry.

Applicants wishing to compete for the scholarship must apply to Dean Walter M. Gage, UBC, Vancouver, not later than August 15, setting forth qualifications as set out above.

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500 Cheer City Dancers In Final Show

A standing-room only crowd clapped and shouted its approval last night as the Civic Centre association staged the second performance of "Sweethearts on Parade."

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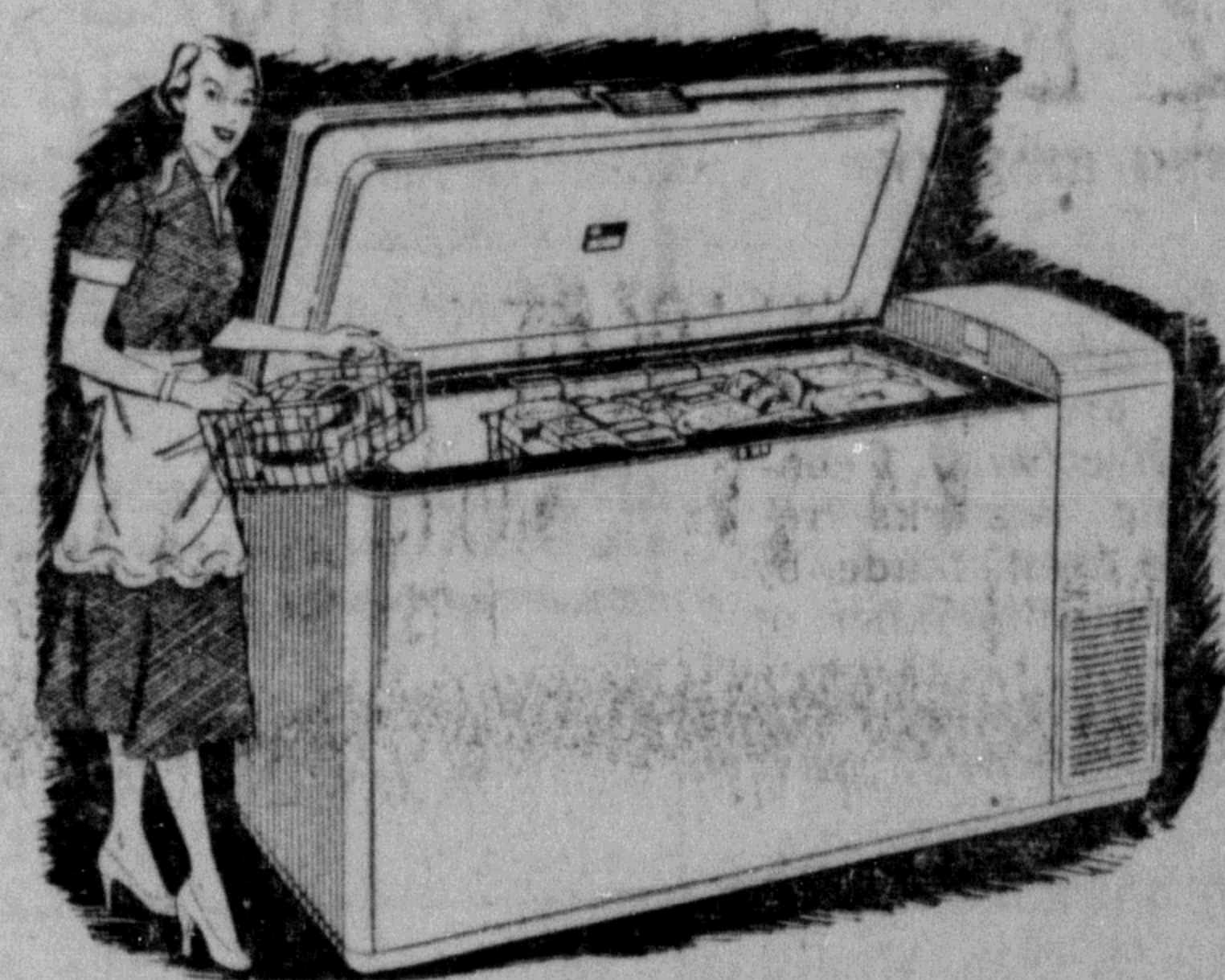
