Ninth Inning Upset Spells Near Disaster

Gordon & Anderson 7, Abel & Odowes 6
 Gordon & Anderson just barely eked out their first victory over Abel & Odowes Sunday after losing along with a wide margin for six innings.

A disaster-spelling ninth gave the Clothiers five runs from three errors and two hits, including a major upset of defence plans.

With two men on bases, dangerous catcher Dave Abel picked up the wood, and playing-manager Stan Cornwell decided to walk him. After the second ball from relief-pitcher Don Scherk, the six-foot catcher decided he'd had enough. He struck at the third ball, reaching high to drive a long one into deep left.

Left-fielder Andy Marshall made the grab running hard, but couldn't hold it. He fell and dropped the ball. The upset accounted for two runs batted in with Abel himself hanging onto second.

The last inning rally which began with a 7-1 spread for the Hardware nine was incited by shortstop Giordano whose grounder went through second baseman Jack Herb. Hodgson, who planted a three-sacker three innings previous, came up with a hit, followed with one by Cliff Dahl, who held down the mound since the second inning.

Abel came home on the second error by Herb which also brought Vic Dell to second when his grounder roared between the legs of the erring second sacker.

EARLY LEAD
 Gordon & Anderson's big lead came in the first and second innings when pitcher-shy Alex Bill decided to put himself on the mound—a choice he had reason to regret.

Bill sent six men to bases for free, gave up five hits and allowed seven runs—three due to fielding errors—before veteran 42-year-old Cliff Dahl was beckoned from second base.

Although not a regular pitcher by any means, Dahl struck out 10, gave up three hits and three free bases and no runs.

Rookie chucker Freddie Christianson turned in a solid performance for G & A, pitching seven innings in which he gave up only two hits and one run. Manager Cornwell replaced him with Don Scherk in the eighth. He started well but found himself faced with the troublesome ninth in which he let the five runs go by before putting in the stopper.

Only long ball of the game was hit by Clothiers' outfielder Jim Hodgson in the sixth—a threebagger which brought home Giordano. Hodgson got himself tagged in an attempt to steal home with two away.
