Stars of Other Years Back On London Stage

LONDON.—Women who dread advancing years should give a close look at Britain's theatre bills this season.

Drawing big audiences at several West End houses are such old-time favorites as Dames Sybil Thorndike and Edith Evans, respectively 69 and 64; Isabel Jeans, 61, looking an attractive "just over 30," and silver-haired Gladys Cooper, who at 63 can still hold a stage by her power of complete stillness.

Age, or maturity, says Cecil Wilson of the Daily Mail, "has never shone so youthfully on stage and screen... just old enough at 60 seems to be the actor's cue for 1952."

DASH AND SPARKLE

In support of this, Sybil Thorndike and Edith Evans give a performance of dash and sparkle in "Waters of the Moon," long a London hit, while two plays by Noel Coward now running have Isabel Jeans and Gladys Cooper to emphasize the popularity of "ageless beauty."

In a revival of "The Vortex," one of Coward's earliest plays, Miss Jeans shrugs off the years with a warm smile lighting her oval face. Married to dramatist Gilbert Wakefield, she is considered one of the best-dressed English actresses.

In "Relative Values," Coward's latest play, thrice-married Gladys Cooper, wearing an apple-green dinner gown of lanceli jersey draped in full and graceful lines, recalls the pin-up picture postcards of herself that decorated many windows in the days before the First World War when she won fame as a Gaiety girl.

Her first big part came in 1907 as Eva in "The Girls of Gottenburg."

In "Relative Values," this tall, stately woman has a part suited to her somewhat chilly regal beauty.

Record Music Festival For Halifax

HALIFAX.—The curtains of Queen Elizabeth auditorium swing back today to introduce the 1952 edition of the Halifax Music Festival.

Close to 15,000 contestants—believed to be the largest in the history of music festivals in the Maritimes—will participate in the eight-day event.

Since the festivals were organized in 1947, the number of contestants has increased by 50 percent, each year marking a sharp increase. Last year there were 14,000 contestants.

A group of 230 school choirs will enter. This is the largest school group ever to enter a festival.
