Politics Versus Statehood

"HE political angle injected into statehood arguments for Hawaii and Alaska is merely a "smoke screen." It is not entitled to serious consideration.

As Senator Butler is quoted as saying in committee: "I don't know why this committee needs oncern itself with whom we are going to elect."

Certain Democrats charged that Republicans wanted to admit Hawaii for statehood since it was Republican, but opposed Alaska statehood because t was Democratic. Thus, the supposition was that Hawaii would send two Republican senators to Congress while Alaska would send two Democrats.

There is no assurance of such elective action in wither case. In fact, Alaska elected a Republican legislature in the last election.

The McCarthy investigation of corruption in Alaska also is charged by advocates of Alaska statemood to be a deliberate political game to delay action.

A bill has just been introduced to allow any future state only one senator. .

Representatives of the house are elected to ongues according to population.

Previously a bill was proposed also to elect anators on a population basis.

The crux of the whole question is not whether Hawaii would elect Republican senators or Alaska elect Democratic senators, but whether either is ready and capable of assuming statehood status.

With big government construction work in Alaska easing off, The Daily News believes Alaska not ready or carable of supporting immediate ratehood.


