century Canadian history. The McLaren grist and saw mill was established by the government in 1879 to encourage the growing of crops and the

use of lumber by Indians. The mill was built of stone and wood and equipped with machinery transported up the Missouri river to Fort Benton, Mont., then hauled overland to the site. Lumber was contracted for and taken by string teams to Fort Macleod and Lethbridge. about 50 miles to the east. Many houses in the district were constructed with timber from the


