Children's Health Program Outlined at Teachers' Meet

Speaking at the monthly
meeting of the Prince Rupert
Teachers' Association, Public
Health Officer Dr. S. F. Carr de-
scribed public health facilities
available for development of
physically well and emotionally
well adjusted children.

After outlining school health
as controlled by the public health
department, Dr. Carr stressed
that locally the approach is to
devote time to those who physi-
cally, emotionally, or mentally
need special help rather than to
superficially examine large num-
bers of children.

In a discussion period, Dr.
Carr stated that it is hoped that
all pre-school children will be

registered next spring for medi-
cal examination before starting
school in the fall. Dr. Carr then
suggested several symptoms
which would justify referral of a
child by the teacher to the
school nurse.

Earlier in the meeting, Presi-
dent R. H. Davidson introduced
Mr. Sawadsky, a new teacher at
Booth school.
