Excitement Cause Vimy Dance Runaway Speeder At Stewart

TELKWA. — Excitement was occasioned when a message from Smithers was despatched to Telkwa saying that a runaway speeder was on the loose and had to be stopped at all costs. Quick action on the part of A. H. Irving, agent at Telkwa, helped avert what might have been a serious accident.

Mr. Irving ran out and threw the switch and then contacted the section crew who were just coming in from the track. A crowd assembled as word passed from one to another. Conjecture was rife as to how the speeder got away from Smithers.

Eventually, the speeder, which had a pushcar in front, approached from the west and seconds later it careened over the bridge at a speed of about 35 miles an hour. In hot pursuit was another speeder carrying a Smithers crew who were endeavoring to overtake the runaway.

A thoughtful spectator stopped all highway traffic as the section men threw boards and planks across the rails hoping to divert the speeder into a snow bank or at least check its speed. Their efforts were unsuccessful and the runaway flew by and into the switch which brought it to an abrupt stop. Splinters of boards flew as the speeder lunged and went over into the spur. Considerable damage was done.

at the opening, followed by the singing of "O Canada" and the proceedings terminated by singing "God Save The Queen." It was a big evening.

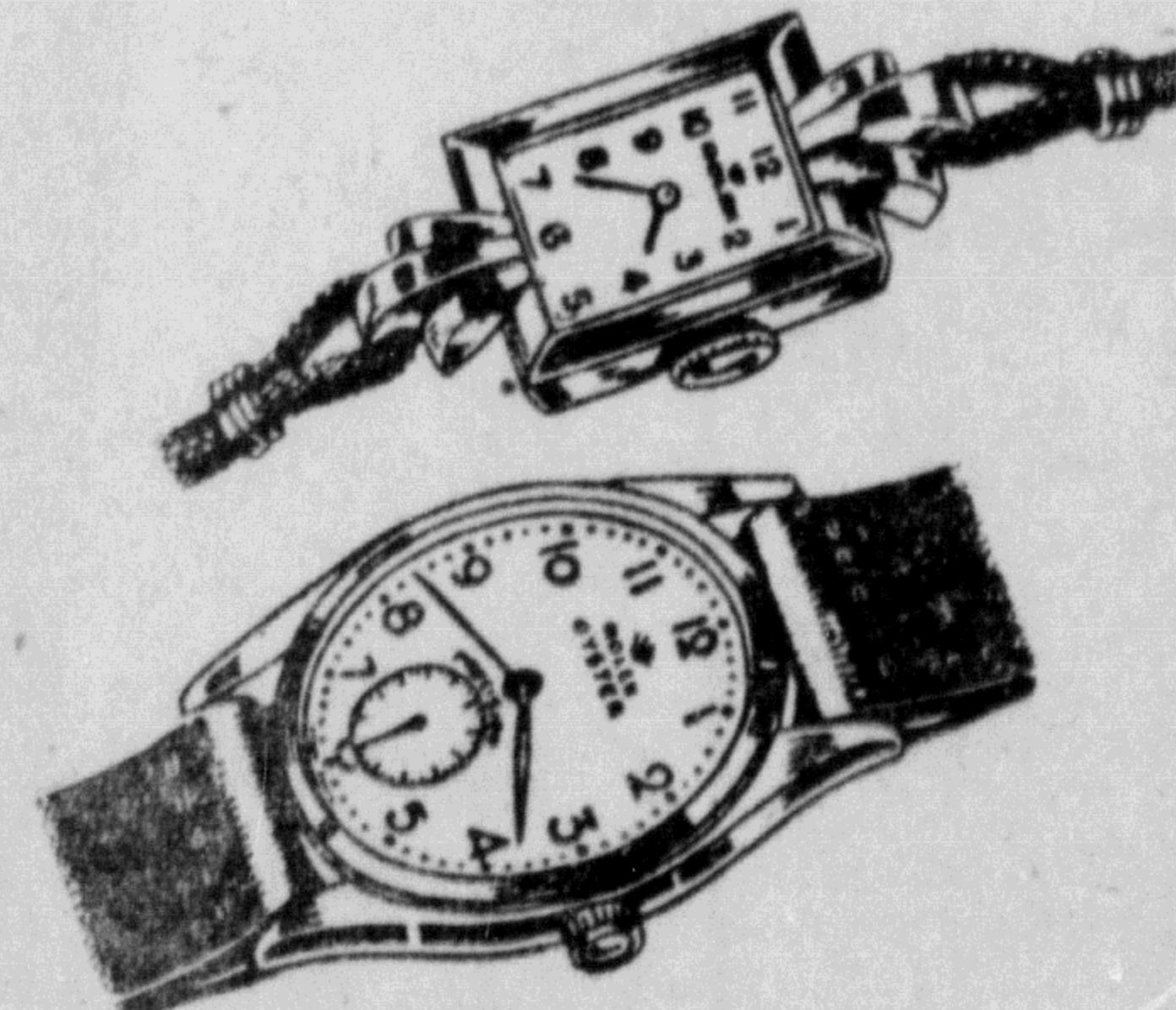
Three Cornered Fight in Atlin
