Ignoring Science on Bid Pays Off Big Sometimes

Mr. Champion heartily disapproves of Miss Brash's bidding. He says it's not scientific. That's one reason. Another, undoubtedly, is that it often fixes him.

"When I've got a chance for four spades, I just bid four spades," Miss Brash says. "If you monkey around with a lot of scientific bids, they know what to lead against you."

Whether that theory had anything to do with Mr. Champion's lead in today's hand or not, the fact remains that he did not get his hand on the killer, which was the lone diamond.

Instead, he lead the king of clubs. Mr. Dale played the queen on this trick, a conventional play suggesting that the opening leader underlead his ace on the next club lead.

Mr. Champion properly read that as indicating that Mr. Dale had the jack of clubs. The queen could hardly be a singleton as that would give Miss Brash the unlikely holding of five clubs to the jack.

In any case, Mr. Champion now saw the possibility of getting in one of his small trumps by entering his partner's hand with a club and ruffing a diamond return. Accordingly he led his lone diamond at trick two.

At first glance there is no way to prevent the diamond ruff. But Miss Brash found a way. On the bidding, it was most likely that Mr. Champion had the ace of hearts. So she won queen of diamonds and led the

Musk-Oxen Penalty Increased

YELLOWKNIFE, N.W.T. (CP)—The Northwest Territories council, in a move to protect the herd of musk-oxen in the Theban sanctuary of the eastern Mackenzie district, has increased the penalty for hunting the animals.

Council has approved a penalty on conviction of a fine of \$1,000 to \$5,000 or imprisonment of six months to a year.

The sanctuary, consisting of 15,000 square miles just east of the Yellowknife Game Reserve, was established in 1927. The few musk-oxen originally sheltered there have increased to a herd of about 1,000.

Meanwhile, the council's legal adviser doubts the council's right to bar persons from the sanctuary and a ruling will be sought.

Council's bill containing a complete revision of the territories' liquor laws was withdrawn because the revised Criminal Code was laid over at Ottawa.

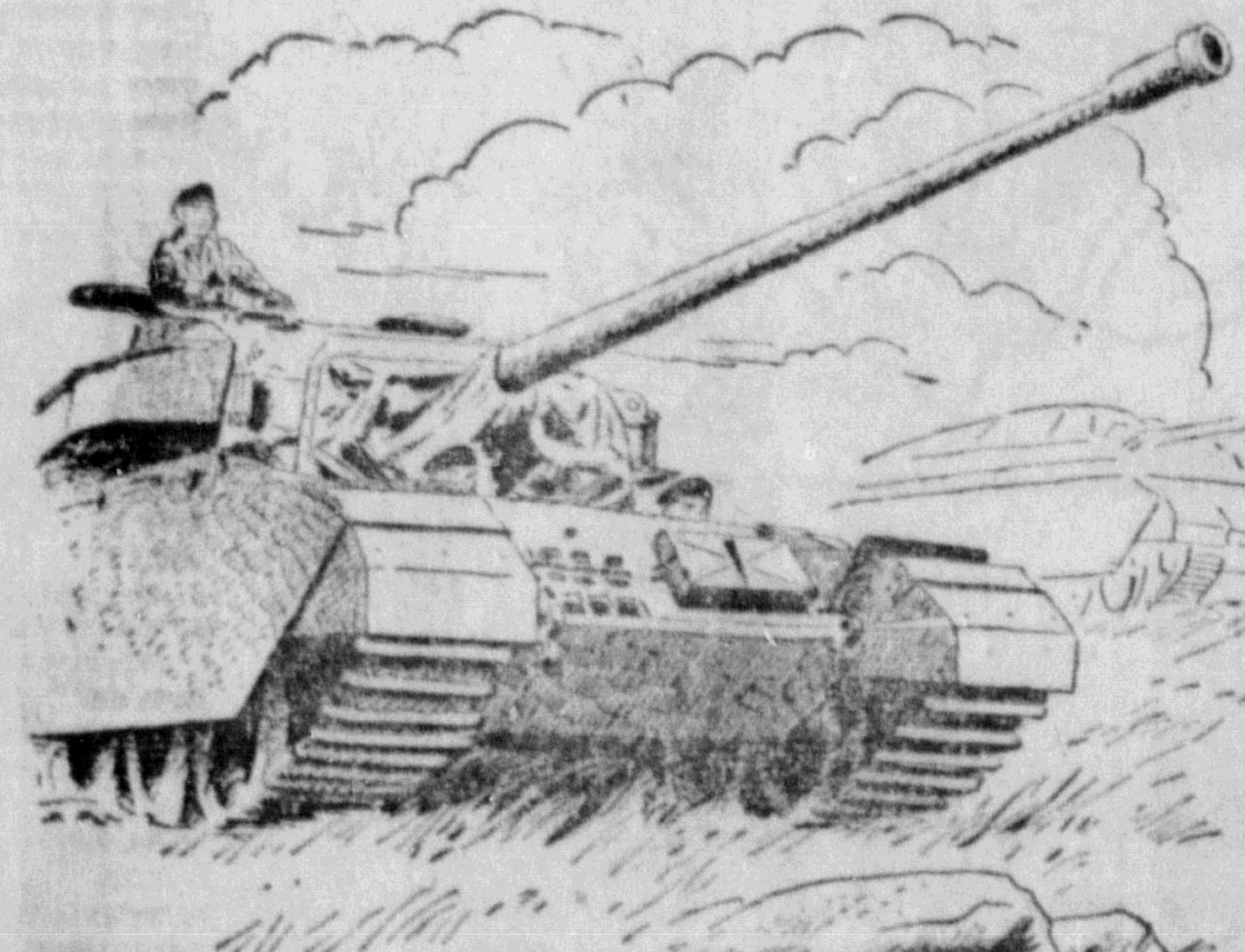
