## Flood Scenes in Holland Have Likeness to Canada

BERGEN OP ZOOM (CP)—With one difference Holland today could have been British Columbia's Fraser Valley in 1948 or Manitoba in the spring of 1950.

There is a sameness in the stunned look of refugees being ferried to safety in lumbering army trucks, in the tired, swollen eyes of thousands of volunteer-like workers and in the ironically dusty streets ending at rippling flood waters.

The difference is that this is a killer flood.

On a tour of observation for the Canadian Red Cross Society it was difficult to remember that this was Overlake, Holland, instead of Asquith, B.C.

## BLACKWOOD on Bridge

## Sticking To Only One Line Of Play Leads to Defeat

Mr. Abel became obsessed with one line of play in today's hand—to the exclusion of all others. As is usual, when that happens, he lost his contract when he could have made it.

Mr. Masters got off to the killing lead of a low club. Mr. Champion put up the king and the ace won. Mr. Abel's prospects were now dreary indeed. He had a club loser, a spade loser and two losers in the trump suit.

He immediately began thinking how he might lead trumps so that the ace and king would fall together. Should he go to dummy with the ace of diamonds and hope Mr. Champion had the doubleton king and would cover? Or should he lead a low heart from his hand, hoping Mr. Masters had the king doubleton and would go in with the king?

Playing against such formidable opponents, he was wasting his time along these lines but in any case he finally decided on the latter alternative. He led a low heart and Mr. Masters promptly played the trey, knowing that if Mr. Abel had the ace of trumps he either would have laid it down or would have gone to the board and led a heart up for a finesse.

Thus Mr. Abel lost two hearts, a spade and a club. But he needn't have lost all these tricks. His best bet was to start leading diamonds at trick two. If the diamonds were divided 3-3, he had an excellent chance.

The way he actually played the hand, there was no chance at all.

As you see, the diamonds did break and on the fourth lead of that suit what was Mr. Masters to do? If he ruffed with the king, dummy's last club would be discarded and only two hearts and a spade lost.

If he ruffed low, again the last club would be played from dummy. Now, as soon as Mr. Abel gained the lead again, he would lead a trump and the ace and king would fall together—just as he had hoped in the first place.

## Oil Firm Head Denies Story

ABERDEEN, Wash. (AP)—The president of Ocean City Oil Fields, Inc., says that two men, one described as a former associate of Al Capone and the second an attorney who represented the late Chicago gang leader, are in no way connected with his firm in its oil exploration activity in western Grays Harbor country.

R. A. Brossard, Vancouver, B.C., capitalist, made the comment at a special meeting called Monday following a Seattle newspaper's Sunday story.

The Seattle Times said that Joseph C. Fusco, whom it described as a principal Capone

syndicate lieutenant during the prohibition era, and Abraham Teitelbaum, who as a lawyer represented Capone, are among backers of oil exploration activity at Ocean City.
