Italian Fashions

FLORENCE (AP)—Italy's finest fashion houses took the lid off their spring and summer collections today—and out popped a flared hipline, skin-tight jackets, baby bonnet hats and decorations embroidered in straw.

These stood out among the new tricks of the old trade of fashion with which Italy is making her strongest bid for world markets. Her finest houses came here from Milan, Turin, Florence, Rome and Capri to show their wares three weeks ahead of Paris.

"This time they can't say we copied," said one designer.

Here to look them over are buyers representing some of the world's big name stores.

Most of the Italian houses are following the same sales formula which attracted attention last summer—prices 10 to 20 per cent below Paris.

Some buyers said, "If Italy really produces something, it may create a competition that will bring Paris prices down a bit."

The offerings of most of the houses were kept hush-hush, because of extremely competitive conditions. But preview showings earlier this week by two major Rome designers showed these trends:

There's a new collar, shaped like an open bucket, that slopes up ear-high from the shoulder line. It's used on dresses and coats alike.

One designer used lots of trick little hats—which she had copied from her own baby's bonnet.

All through the line there was a "hippy" look. Accentuated by generous use of unpressed pleats and in suits with skin-tight jackets with a fishtail flare.

Skirts were very full and hemlines stayed at mid-calf length, unchanged from last year.

Necklines kept to the V. Colors were black or white or very bright. There were few pastels.

PARIS NOT WORRIED

PARIS (AP)—Paris fashion designers are not losing any sleep over competition from the current Italian dress shows.

"What is this 'Italian look'?" It doesn't exist! It is the reaction of French designers, busy with preparations for their own openings commencing Feb. 1.

"Let the American buyers play around with baby bonnets, in Italy; they'll still come to us for their serious buying," said dressmaker Pierre Balmain today.

"The Italians may be competition for London, but they're not for Paris."

"We have always sold models to Italian houses, and they're still buying from us. Did you ever hear of a Paris house buying models in Italy? No, we're not worried. The novelty of the Italian shows is almost worn off already, and that's all they ever had."

Jacques Faith said: "The Italians can't do us any harm."
