Dale Backs Abel Into a Corner

Miss Brash tried hard to shut out the opposition with a jump to four hearts over Mr. Masters' takeout double. Mr. Dale seems to have little enough for a free bid at the four level, but his bid was well justified. There was an excellent chance that Mr. Masters had as many as four spades. And if it were possible to beat four hearts, there should be some play for 10 tricks at spades.

If, by some remote chance, Mr. Masters saw fit to bid five diamonds or five clubs, Mr. Dale's hand would be a very respectable dummy for either contract.

Four spades was there, all right, but it had to be handled carefully. Mr. Abel led the king of hearts and Miss Brash played the deuce.

Mr. Abel now decided to shift. Since he had the jack of diamonds, a diamond shift didn't seem to be the answer. He therefore played the queen of clubs.

Now it was Mr. Dale who had the problem. He decided the queen of clubs was either a singleton or part of a doubleton. If he ducked and the queen were a singleton, Miss Brash could overtake with the king and return the suit for her partner to ruff.

But would Miss Brash make that play? If Mr. Dale false-carded with the seven of clubs, she could not be sure that Mr. Abel had led a lone club.

There was also the fact that if Mr. Abel had started with a lone club, he probably would have led it at trick one. With these thoughts in mind, Mr. Dale let the queen of clubs win.

Mr. Abel then led his last club. Dummy's ace won and the queen of spades was finessed. Mr. Abel won with the king but, since he was out of clubs there was no way to cash the setting trick. Desperately, he underled his ace of hearts. Mr. Dale ruffed, picked up the remaining trumps and discarded dummy's last two clubs on his long diamond suit.

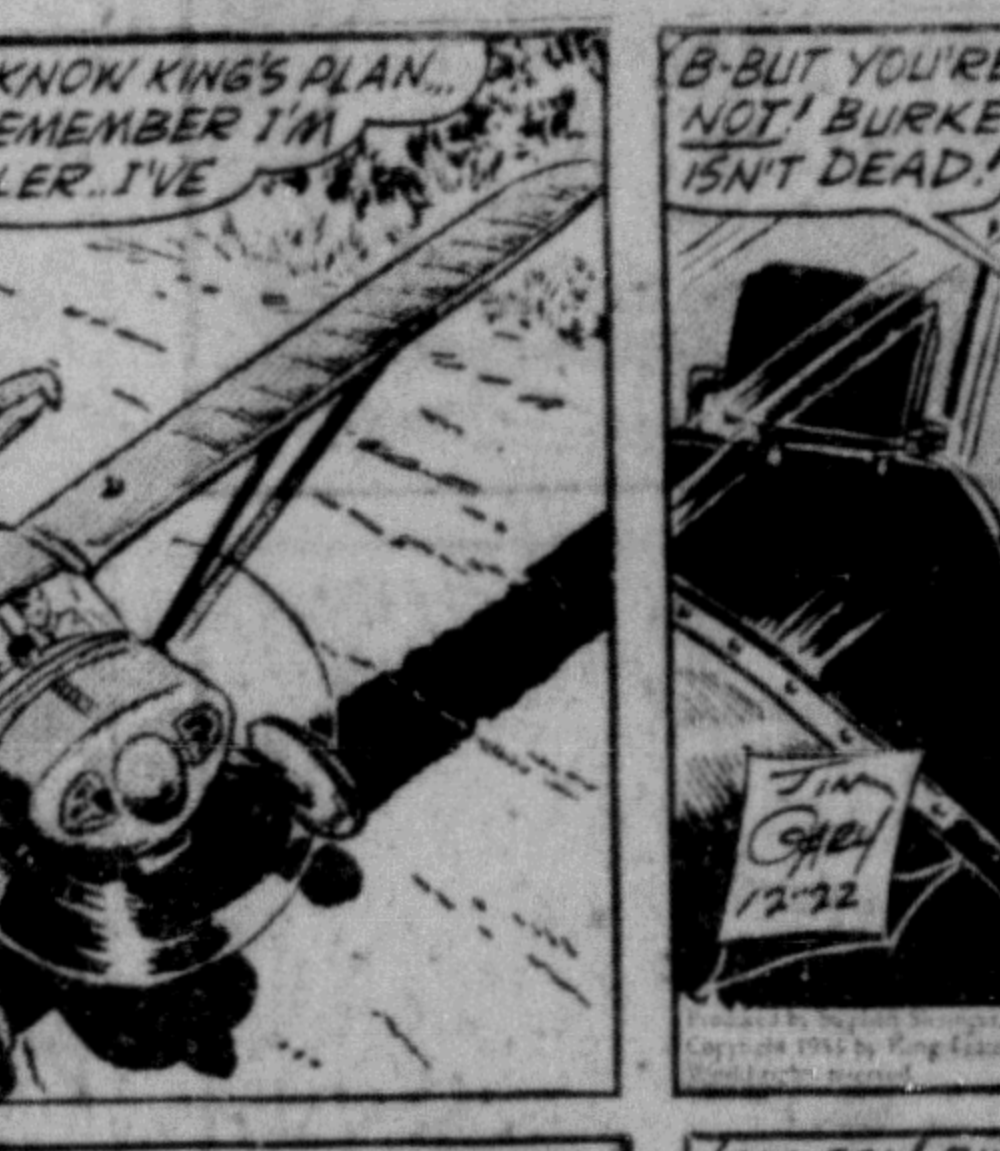
