ture 39 acres in the Algonquin Park area, the board plans to start with improvement of the present playing field and provision of new facilities.

Algoma could also be a beauty spot, they said, noting that good natural soil was already available in the park near Hay Creek, and that the location was comparatively protected from the weather.

Commissioners also stressed that their proposed sanitary fill method of reclaiming Algoma Park land would solve the city's garbage dump problem.

The commissioners planned to ask permission to outline their plans for Algoma Park at the next meeting of the newly-formed Civic Affairs Association, and at the next meeting of the Community Ratepayers' Association.

They also planned to prepare copies of a sketch plan of the proposed Algoma Park development to distribute at such meetings so that voters could see for themselves what is planned.
