Win Gardiner, a newcomer to the local shuttles, downed all opposition in the four-day Prince Rupert Badminton Club tournament to win the men's singles championship last night.

Prentice defeated Frank Olson in the semis, then overcame Doug Christensen in an exciting final game, 15-12, 5-15 and 17-16 for the consolation award. Cross and McKay downed Dot Paulding and Dot White, 18-15 and 17-14, in an exciting and closely contested final match to win the ladies' doubles championship.

In the consolation event Manjlovich and Toffoli defeated Helen Balgoin and Charlotte Rouse, 15-9, 15-10, in another close game.

In men's doubles, Mills and Viereck won the championship from Herb Morgan and Nick Pavlikis, combining tricky net shots and skillfully placed drives. Result was 15-11, 15-7. Consolation event saw Moxley and Christensen defeat Fred Aston and Olson, 15-11, 15-8, for the award.

Cross and Mills came from behind to win the mixed doubles championship by defeating George and Mary Viereck, 8-15, 15-12 and 15-12, in the most exciting event of the evening. Both sides were well matched and displayed brilliant net shots and powerful, well-placed drives. Consolation event, Manjlovich and Vickerman downed Don Hartwig and Pat Hixon, 15-6, 15-9.

Awards will be presented April 29, following regular badminton at 9 p.m. when players will retire to the ladies' lounge in the Civic Centre. A buffet supper is included.

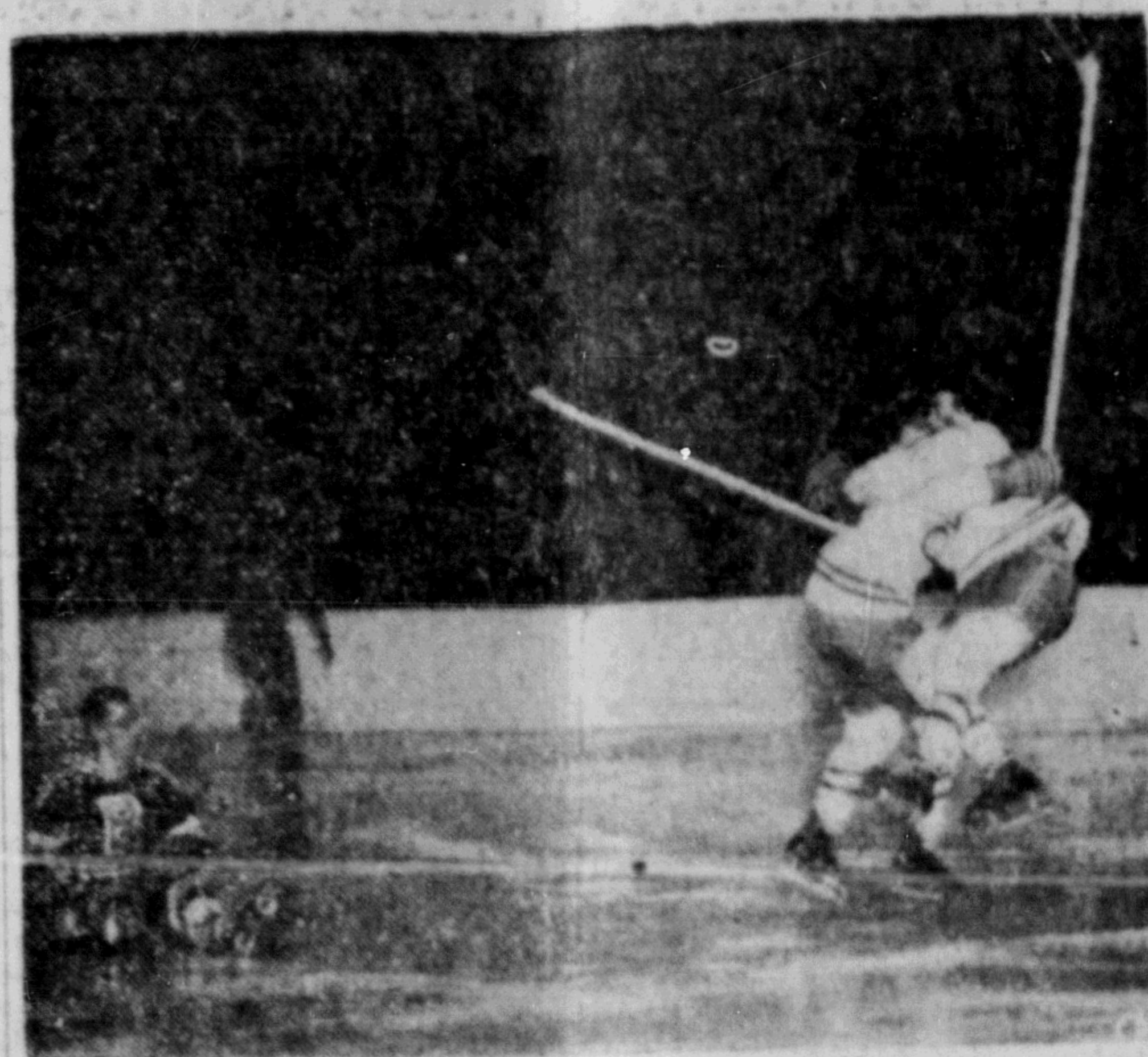
The Cabot Trail in Newfoundland winds from Bonaville, where John Cabot landed in 1497 to St. John's.

NEW YORK (AP)—Last year Brooklyn Dodgers won only eight of their 22 games against New York Giants, and yet they were able to distance the Polo Grounders by a comfortable margin because they slaughtered the tail-end Pirates, Braves and Reds 54-11.

Charlie Dressen, manager of the defending National League champions, does not believe it possible for his athletes to again run up such a staggering margin over the second-division patsies. For one thing, the law of averages is against it, and for another the Dodger pilot is convinced that there is more sound strength in the National League's lower bracket than there was a year ago.

Some British Soccer Fields Get Floodlights

LONDON 9.—Floodlit soccer is getting out of the novelty class in Britain.

Although it may be a long time before the sport's controlling body authorizes league or cup games after dark, the subject is attracting increasing attention. A bulletin from the Football Association, overlord of British soccer, devotes a detailed technical article to the money and equipment needed for "standardization of floodlighting." This is in reply to queries from "many clubs, large and small," arranged for installation.

GLOOMY WINTER
Britain's dark and gloomy winter probably is behind the move for facilities for night practice and play, especially in lower-class or municipal and amateur fields. Installation at about £350 is deemed "comparatively inexpensive."

First division club giants seeking the best possible lighting system can pay more than £10,000. "All the clubs that have installations, small or large, are enthusiastic about the possibilities," said the article, implying that the paying public likes the lights, too.

That is substantiated by accounts from clubs that already have lights.

A survey shows that practically all experienced gates as good as before, and some had better. London's powerful Arsenal played its first floodlit game in August, 1951, and its second game a month later drew 63,000, compared with the average league attendance so far this year of 54,000.

La Starza and Bucceroni Near Top In Boxing Association Spring Ratings

WASHINGTON (AP)—Roland La Starza and Dan Bucceroni jumped into the heavyweight title picture today on the strength of the National Boxing Association's spring ratings.

La Starza, a slick boxer who lost a much-disputed split decision to champion Rocky Marciano three years ago, hopped into the No. 3 challenger spot on the basis of his victory over Rex Layne during the winter.

Bucceroni climbed from nowhere into the No. 4 challenger position, and he claims he's ready to take on all comers.

Former champions Jersey Joe Walcott and Ezzard Charles are rated one-two behind Marciano. Walcott gets a shot at the title May 15.

Col. Harvey Miller, NBA secretary, said "the natural assumption" is that Charles will take on La Starza, with the winner getting the next crack at the title.

NO SURPRISES

There were no major surprises in the NBA's spring ratings, which contain only one Canadian. Four men were lumped in the top middleweight bracket, where a champion still is to be crowned to replace the retired Sugar Ray Robinson.

Randy Turpin of England, who took the title from Robinson once only to lose it again, is listed at the top, followed in order by Bobo Olson of Hawaii, Charles Humez of France, and Paddy Young.

The NBA said the eventual champion is expected to come from a meeting of the winners in semi-final bouts between Turpin and Humez, Olson and Young.

Jimmy Carter, the lightweight champion, is the first of the current titlists to defend his championship. He takes on Tommy Collins of Massachusetts in a 15-round fight at Boston tomorrow.

Collins is rated the No. 4 challenger. Ahead of him come George Araujo, Henry Davis and Johnny Gonzales.

The lone Canadian in the rankings is Arthur King of Toronto. British Empire Lightweight champion, King received honorable mention.

King outpointed third-ranked Davis in a 10-round bout in Toronto Monday night.

Robert Conn of Algonquin, Pappy Gault are logical contenders for the bantamweight crown of Australia's Jimmy Guthrie. 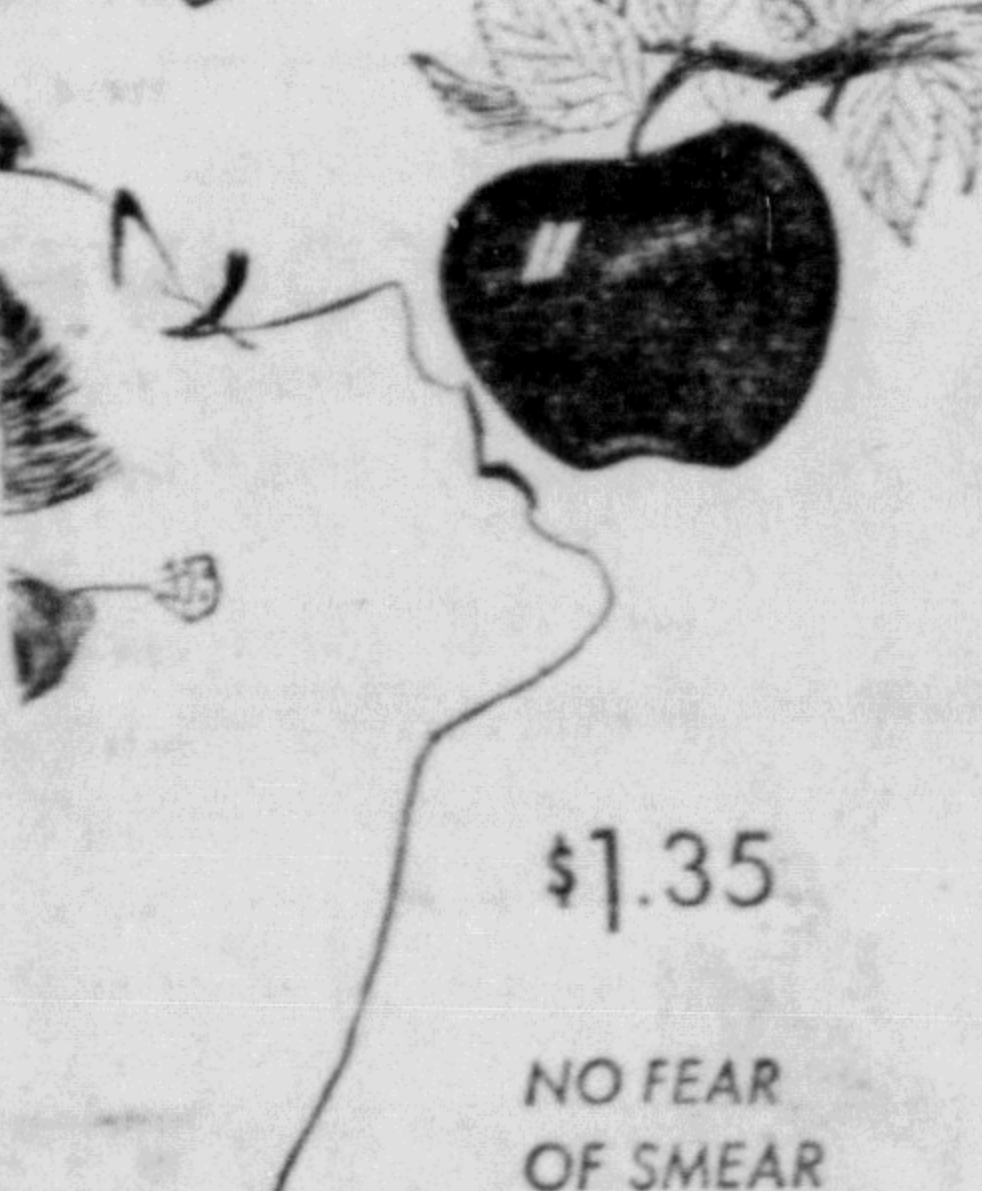
