

Outdoors ... with Marty

There are a select few smart anglers who are taking advantage of the run of smelts now at Fairview, they are being well rewarded by very good light tackle sport and some of the best eating obtainable anywhere.

The flyrod folk use a small black gnat or similar, while common garden worms work for the hand-liner. Fish are visible and take bait within a dozen feet of the fisherman, a small spinner-fly or tiny finger-nail size piece of any fish bait kept slowly moving through the school will bring fast results.

A pretty good book by O. Rodman entitled "A Handbook of Salt-Water Fishing" is now at the Civic Centre library and offers considerable information for him who seeks it, not too much dope on our salmon or other northern fishes, but proper reading for most anglers, I feel sure.

The question arose as to using a spinning reel on a light casting rod; this would be teaming up a mule and a horse, both excellent animals but better used separately! When line leaves the fixed spool of a spinning reel it jumps forward in large spiraling coils, these must be properly reduced in diameter in order to straighten out when following the lure, consequently all spinning-rod guides are much larger than others; if one used small guides the obvious consequence would be a terrific pile-up of line at the bottom guide and a total loss of many yards.

When purchasing tackle, be very certain that you select equipment best suited to the work you have mostly in mind, and remember that the spinning outfit is at its best on fish that will maintain a slashing fight. The necessary "softness" of the spinning rod can be a disadvantage when working deep, or when one is connected to a fish that chooses to sulk at bottom, there is also the difficulty of setting the hook when still-fishing; at all times the spinner angler must keep aware of these things, so the new purchaser must also bear them in mind.

All Large becoming quite consistent taking salmon in the harbor, would be a good man to follow around in case he "lets fall a crumb." Watch him!

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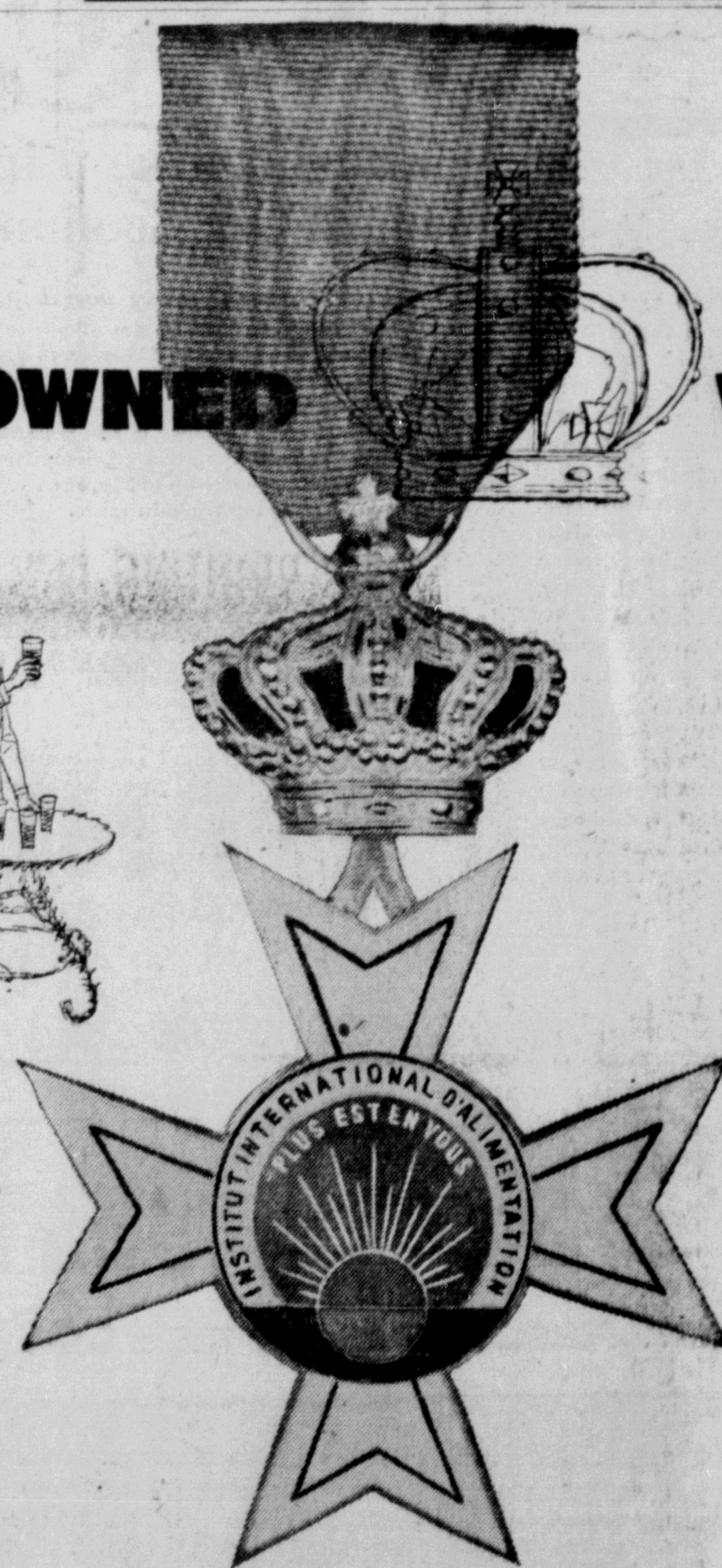

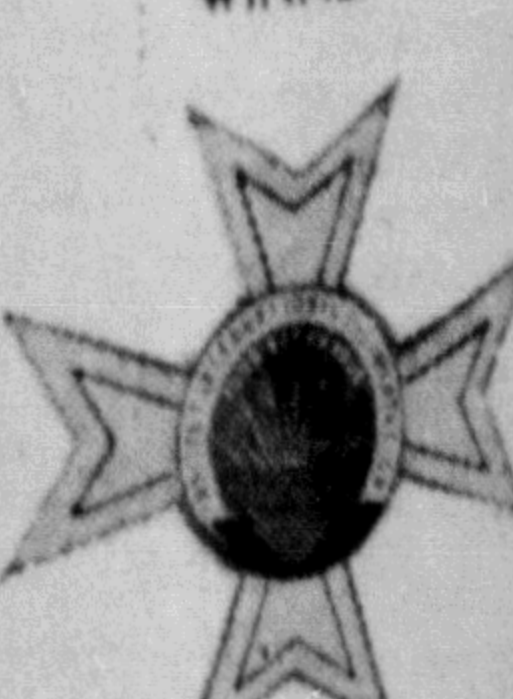
