

G & A Take Twin Bill From Terrace To Strengthen Senior League Lead

League leading Gordon and Anderson took both ends of a double header from the visiting Terrace team yesterday at Roosevelt Park to move four full games ahead of second spot Esquires who were idle and tumbled Terrace into third spot, four and a half games off the pace.

The wins, with scores of 11-3 and 11-0 kept southpaw Freddie Christensen's record perfect in the first game and gave Dennis Reed his third victory and first shutout of the season in the second encounter.

In the opener, Terrace led 3-2 going into the bottom of the fourth when G & A opened up for five big runs which prompted Terrace manager Neil McKerracher to throw in the first of three relief pitchers in an attempt to stem off the G & A

onslaught. Bruce Paterson replaced starter Vic Wilydo who had given up two hits and two runs.

G & A batters liked the offerings of right hander Paterson and finally shelled him from the mound in the bottom of the seventh after collecting seven runs on nine hits, including two doubles by Ralph Endridge, doubles and singles by Bill Sundberg and Don Scherk and singles by Stan Petrow, Christensen and Dennis Reed.

Ross Gillanders stopped the G & A rally in the seventh but issued two free passes in the bottom of the eighth and was replaced by Paul Paulsen who gave up one hit, another two base blow by Endridge that scored Dave Hill and Petrow for the last two G & A runs.

Wilydo, the losing pitcher, hurled three innings, Paterson three and a third, Gillanders two-thirds and Paulsen one inning.

Umpiring duties were handled by Dido Gurvitch behind the plate, Steve Mintenko on first and Glen Carlson at third.

In the seven inning second half of the twin bill, G & A knocked Terrace ace hurler Larry Mathews from the box after the fifth inning after tapping him for 10 runs on eleven hits.

Jack Burton who replaced Mathews gave up two hits and allowed one run.

Sundberg and Scherk repeated their performances of the first game and latched on to doubles, while the rest of the club with the exception of Reed hit at least one single apiece. High man for the second game was Dave Hill who went two for three, Scherk was second with three for five, Endridge was next with two for four and Don Hartwig hit two for five.

In earning his shutout, Reed gave up only four hits, three of them in the third and one in the seventh. He issued two walks and struck out four. Mathews struck out two and gave up four bases of balls before he was replaced. Reliever Burton fanned one and issued no free passes.

Port Edward Scores Shutout In District Soccer Opener

A tireless Port Edward soccer eleven bested the Pulp Workers Local 708 club 4-0 Saturday night at the Prince Rupert district soccer league got under way at Roosevelt Park.

Inside right Nelson Morven scored the third Port Edward tally on a pass from Percy Tait, and then retaliated by feeding Tait a pass for the fourth and final goal.

Refereeing duties were handled by Henry Lindquist.

Wednesday night General Motors will meet Local 708 at 7 p.m. at Roosevelt Park.

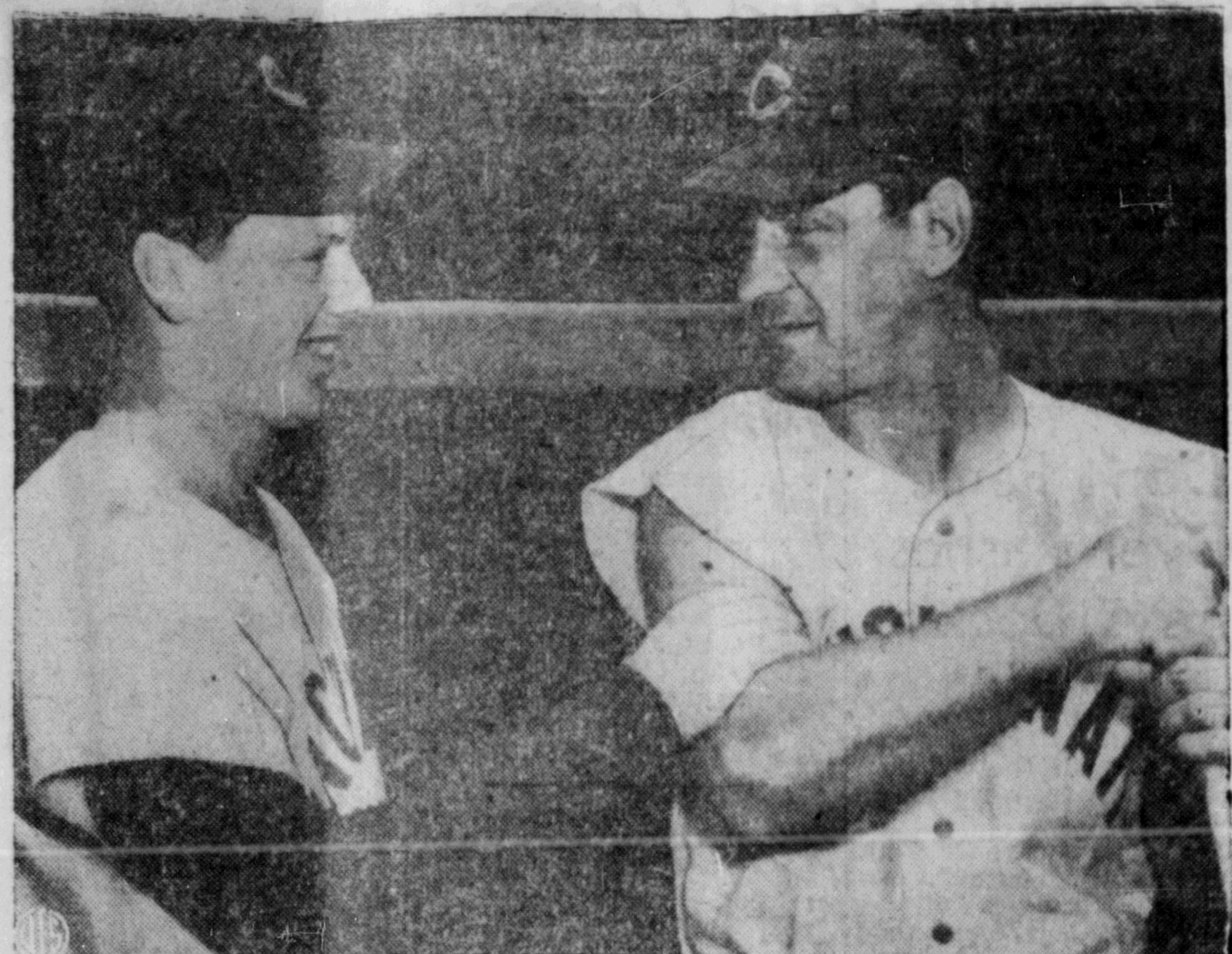

The league closed in on Milwaukee Sunday when St. Louis knocked off the Braves 3-2 for Harvey Haddix's seventh victory. Brooklyn bested New York 5-3, the Phils dumped the Pirates twice, 8-0 and 10-7, and Chicago split two with Cincinnati. The Cubs took the opener 7-5, the first start for ex-outfielder Hal Jeffcoat, but Cincinnati rallied to take the second 6-5 called by darkness after eight innings.

Roy Campanella Back in Action Confident Hitting Will Improve

NEW YORK — "I'm back to stay. I'm gonna catch every day from now on."

Roy Campanella, his left hand hanging loosely in a whirlpool bath used his right to knock on wood as he spoke.

"I felt fine out there today," the slugging Brooklyn Dodger catcher said enthusiastically. "The hand didn't hurt me a bit. Maybe I didn't get any hits but I'm not worried about it. I'm still rusty from not playing. It was the first time I batted in a month."

It was 29 days ago—May 1—that Campanella had played his last game in Cincinnati and left to undergo an operation for the removal of a bone chip in his left hand. At first, it was expected that the surgery would keep him out about eight weeks but he cut that time limit exactly in half.

Campanella wasn't much help at the plate Sunday as the Dodgers took the finale of the three-game series with New York Giants 5-3. He went hitless in four times at bat. But he did a fine job behind the plate.

"Oh, heck," he said. "It's early yet. One week of hitting and I'll be knocking at that 300 mark."
