

VANCOUVER - Steel for the ally refuse to pair—thus keeping \$82 million oil pipeline from Edmonton to Vancouver is now being distributed to construction points along the 700-mile route. First shipment, 438 tons of high test steel pipe, reached White Rock from San Francisco this week and is being moved to sidings.

Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company estimates that it needs 145,000 tons of steel, or about 5000 carloads, to build the line in the next two years.

About 168 carloads of pipe covcrings will also be needed.


