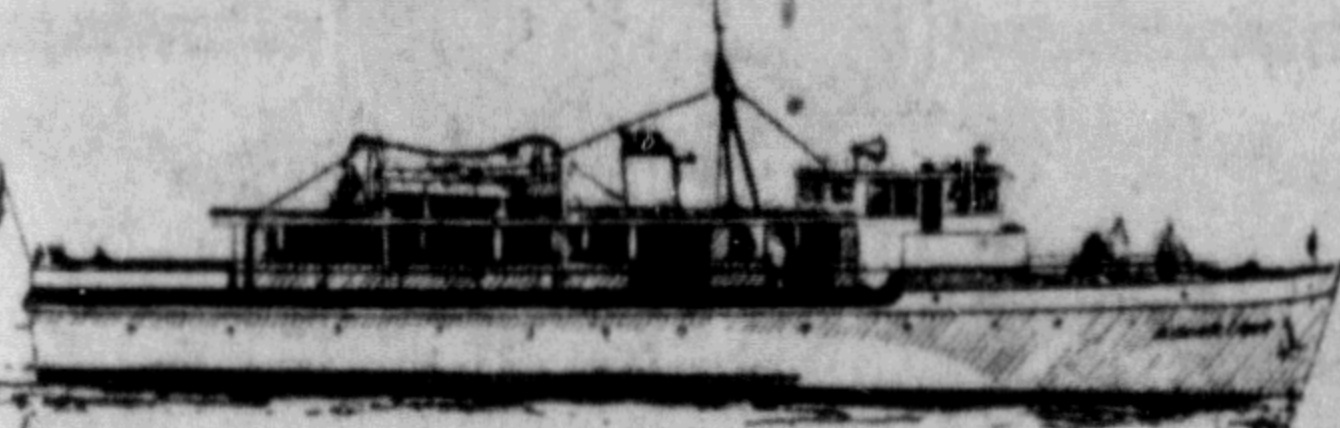

THE INTERNATIONAL SERVICE of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation has transcribed for a special broadcast on July 1, over radio stations and networks in all parts of the world, the "Coronation Suite," by the distinguished Canadian composer, Dr. Healey Willan (left). At right is Dr. Ettore Mazzoleni, the principal of the Toronto Conservatory of Music, who conducted the CBC Orchestra and the CBC Choir in Toronto for the above-mentioned transcription which also commemorates the first anniversary of the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. This July 1 transcription has been sent out to all Canadian embassies, legations and missions abroad. Already, some 40 stations and networks in Europe, Latin America, the British Commonwealth and in other parts of the world have made the necessary arrangements for the broadcast of the July 1 transcription over their facilities.

Newspaperman Visits City

Intrigued by stories of North-western British Columbia and Prince Rupert passed on to him years ago by a friend, Charles A. Bowman, former editor-in-chief of the Ottawa Citizen paid a brief visit to the city yesterday and made it known that he intends to return for a closer and longer look.

Mr. Bowman's friend was none other than R. G. T. Saul, founder of the Prince Rupert Optimist back in 1910 after he left his post in the east where he had been editor of the Prescott Ontario Messenger.

Mr. Bowman, who served on the Royal (Aird) Commission on Radio broadcasting in 1929 which recommended formation of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, served on the Ottawa Citizen from 1913 to 1946. He started his newspaper career there as an editorial page columnist. A relative of his served here at the end of the Second World War, Mr. Bowman said. He was Lt. Cmdr. Robert Bowman, who was in charge of naval engineering here after 1945. Cmdr. Bowman at that time was the oldest naval officer in the RCN.

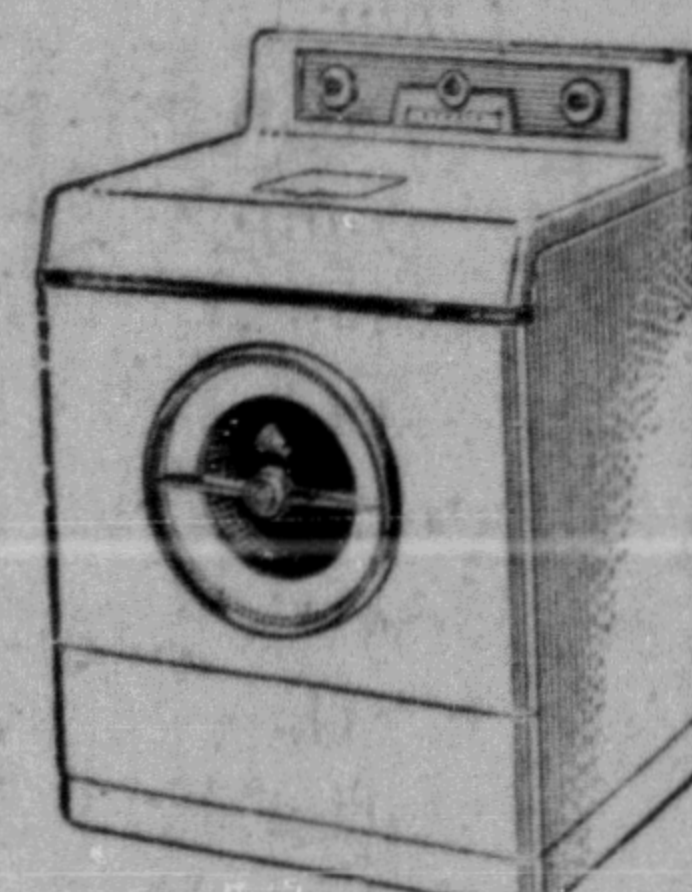

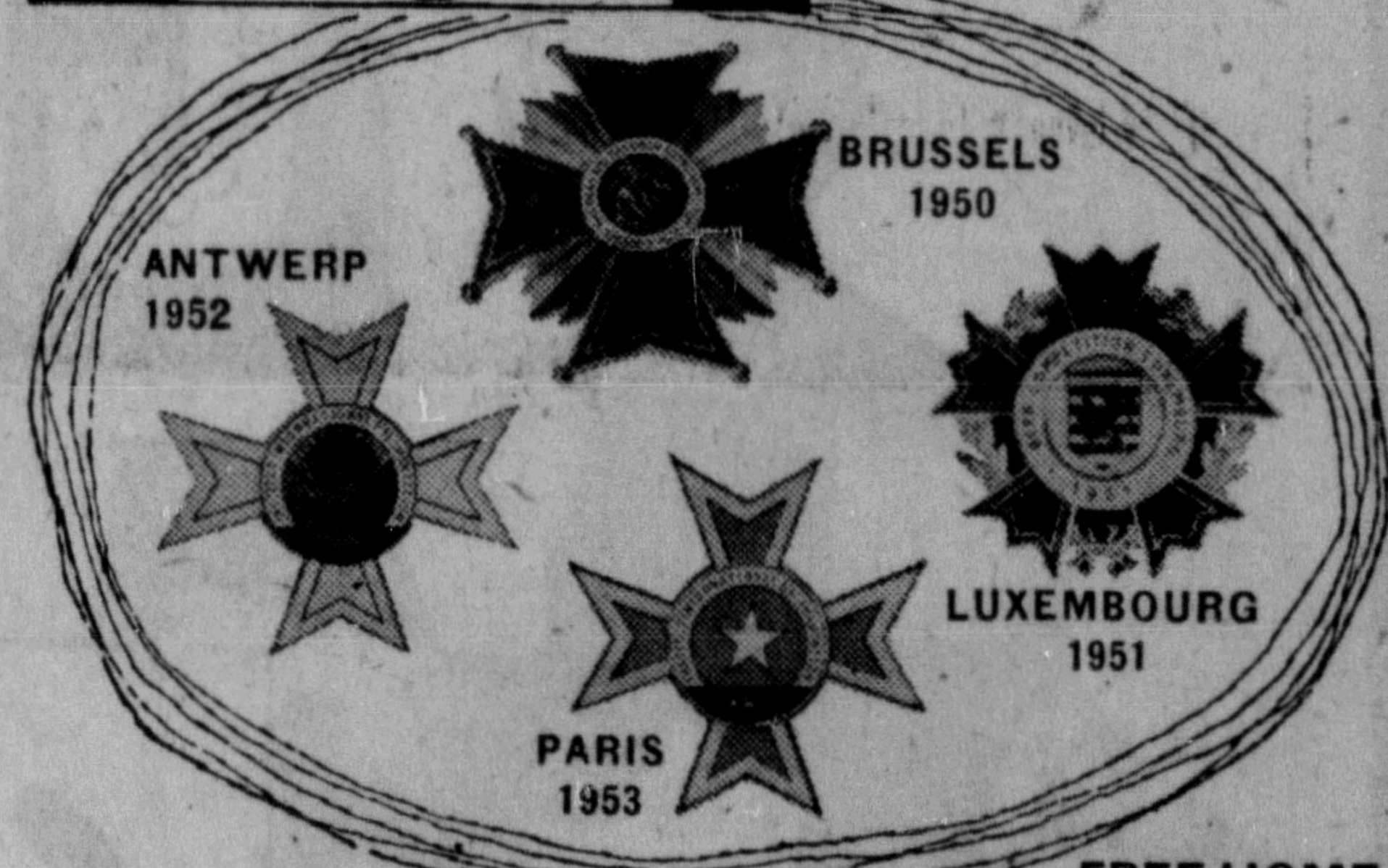
