## SPORTS ROUND-UP

NEW YORK (AP)—It would be a pleasure to report that the fifth straight world series victory of the Yankees was greeted with great popular acclaim and that the bonfires flickered far into the night. It would not, however, be the truth.

The brutal fact is that not very many persons were happy about the way the play-off turned out. The Yankees were, of course, and there are a certain number of Yankee fans about the country who would be glad if their heroes won a dozen flags in a row. But we have a strong feeling that even this group is diminishing.

A Brooklyn triumph would have given baseball a tonic that the game needs badly. The erstwhile U.S. national pastime is in trouble and its executives are a gloomy set of men. We know this from having talked with many of them during the series. They face the future with misgivings, especially the American Leaguers.

"I hate to say it," one of the latter group confided, "but it would be a good thing for everybody if our league lost this time. Every year these fellows (the Yankees) win from here on we're going to have a further drop in attendance. We can't pull the fans back until we can show them a race."

Not an American Leaguer claimed to see any hope of overhauling the Bombers next season, or in the next three or four seasons, for that matter. They are not trying to fool any-

body about their predicament. There has been some thought that Boston Red Sox, who have some brilliant youths going for them, might offer a real treat next year, but the men who know Lou Boudreau's club best say not.

In the first place, they say, the Sox cannot better their fourth-place finish unless they come up with one, preferably two winning righthanded pitchers. Most of their strength now is lefty. Also, they say, the team must develop a better punch in its outfield before it can merit serious consideration.

So that leaves Cleveland and Chicago White Sox, who already have proved to everybody's satisfaction that they are not teams of destiny.

Casey Stengel, himself, doesn't see why his club shouldn't go on winning more or less indefinitely with a little new blood in its pitching staff from time to time. President Dan Topping is quoted as predicting they will make it eight straight pennants, explaining that he thought it a nice, round figure.

Actually, even the Yankee official family appears to be getting bored to some extent. For years they have made a practice of throwing a wingding of a victory-party on the night of the final series game, but they passed it up this time in favor of a quiet gathering within the Yankee family.

## U.K. Hockey Battling Ice Shows

LONDON (CP)—The English National Hockey League resumed action this week with its ranks depleted and its future clouded by high taxes, lower gate receipts and keen competition from ice shows.

Earls Court Rangers have withdrawn for one year at least from the circuit formed in 1934-35. Wembley's last-minute decision to stick has kept the number of teams at five.

Now at its lowest ebb ever, numerically, the league has pared rosters to 10 Canadian and two English players, compared with the 12-2 ratio last year.

The problem is not one of declining interest in this Canadian contribution to Britain's sport. Thanks to television appearances and other factors, hockey is as popular as it ever has been in this country, probably more so.

The No. 1 question appears to be whether full-blown ice extravaganzas are going to push hockey clubs into the street, particularly in London.

Two of the four London clubs last year had to juggle their playing schedules to make room for ice shows, losing out on the choice Saturday night fixtures.

Player calibre has kept up to good Canadian senior B standards on the basis of the players signed to date.

## Eight to 10 Teams Slated For '54 WIL

VANCOUVER (CP)—At least eight and possibly 10 clubs will be in the Western International League when the 1954 baseball season opens next April, league president Bob Brown said Wednesday.

Mr. Brown made the statement when he announced the 1953 all-star teams, chosen by newspaper sport writers. He said that "contrary to reports" the league is not collapsing. Structure of the league for 1954 will be "definitely settled at the annual meeting of the circuit in Victoria on Nov. 9."

## BEG Pool Site Fixed at UBC
