At Hospital

New skin grafting machine, recently installed at Prince Rupert General Hospital, was used for the first time a few days ago by a local surgeon who stated that it operated splendidly and described it as a "fine piece of equipment." Its availability saved having to send the patient to Vancouver.

Second floor of the Prince Rupert General Hospital has had new curtains installed throughout much to the en- couragement of the premises Eastern Star has installed new curtains in his own ward.

Hospital is to improve or the method of distribution of milk. Dr. Duncan Black, medical health officer, not being satisfied with the present technique from a sanitary standpoint. Use of individual half pint bottles had been considered but BCHIS, in the interests of economy, suggests the milk could still be received in large cans with use of covered receptacles to deliver it to the wards. The additional cost entailed by use of the small bottles would be \$75 or \$100 a month. It was referred to the house committee to put an improved system into effect.

Hospital Finances

March Showed Small Surplus With Loss for Year to Date

Prince Rupert General Hospital had a \$438 surplus during the month of March, according to a quarterly financial statement which was presented to the board of directors at its monthly meeting. However, on the operation for the first three months of the year there has been a deficit of 3,454.

Total operating revenue for March was \$30,512 with expenditure of \$30,074. For the first three months of the year the revenue was \$88,135 and the expenditure \$91,589.

Principal item in expenditure was \$18,655 in salaries and wages in March with \$56,225 for the year to date.
