BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Unusual Hand Requires Out-of-Ordinary Treatment

The proper timing of most hands is fairly simple, but now and then you run across a hand which requires very out-of-the-ordinary treatment... as Mr. Abel did in today's deal.

The opening lead was the deuce of diamonds and Mr. Abel read it correctly as a singleton. He knew Mrs. Keen rarely leads a singleton unless she has a quick trump winner, so he mentally placed the ace of hearts in her hand. Suppose he won the first trick and led a heart which Mrs. Keen won?

Her problem would then be how to reach her partner's hand so that she could ruff a diamond return. That would be possible only in one of the black suits. There was at least a 50-50 chance she would return a club and even if the ace were in Mr. Dale's hand, Mr. Abel could ruff, pick up the remaining trumps, concede a diamond trick and make his contract.

He followed this plan but, after winning with the ace of trumps, Mrs. Keen had no prob-

lem. Holding the ace of clubs herself, she led back a spade as the only hope. Mr. Dale took the ace and the following diamond ruff completed the set.

Mr. Champion was as consoling as usual. "How bad can you get?" he asked.

Mr. Abel thought he had reasoned it out pretty well. "What did you want me to do, finesse the diamond at the first trick?" he inquired.

"Of course not," Mr. Champion snapped. "Your ace of diamonds play was all right. But at the second trick you've got to lead the king of clubs."

To Mr. Champion, plays like this are simplicity itself unless, of course, he is the one who misses them.

The fact remains that on this particular hand, the play would have won. If Mr. Dale covered the king of clubs, Mr. Abel could ruff. Actually, he could not cover. So Mr. Abel would discard his lone spade, thus cutting the last possible line of communication between the defenders' hands. Mr. Abel's losers would be confined to the ace of clubs, a trump trick and a diamond trick.

Canada Pitted Against Mexico In Davis Cup

MELBOURNE (CP)—Canada will play Mexico in the first round of the 1953 North American zone Davis Cup play.

Neither dates nor sites for the competitions have been set. The United States will play Japan in the other first-round match while Cuba and the British West Indies drew byes. In the second round the U.S.-Japan winner will oppose British West Indies while Cuba meets the Canada-Mexico winner.

Sir Norman Brookes, president of the Australian Tennis Association, made the draw as R. W. Blake of the Canadian legislation watched.

At the conclusion of the North American tournament, the area champion will play the champions of the European and Asiatic zones for the right to challenge Australia, cup holders the last two years.

Seaman Admits Stealing Meat

VICTORIA (CP)—Leading seaman William Gordon, 22, of Victoria, admitted Monday in Esquimalt police court to stealing meat from HMCS Naden.

He is jointly charged with Walter James Gallagher, 45-year-old civilian.

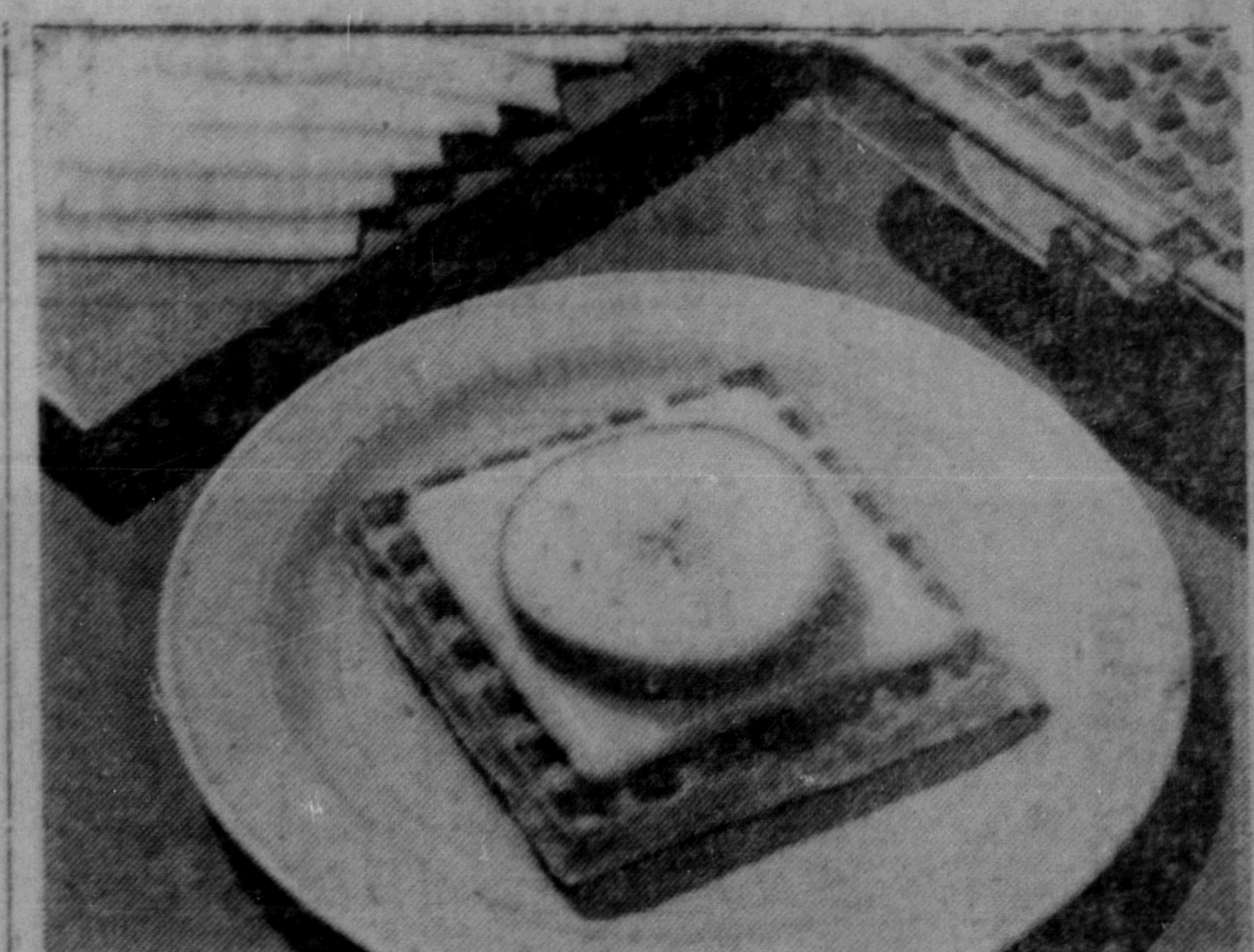
Both have been remanded to March 20.

Waffles are an old Dutch treat that once were baked in long-handled irons over an open fire.

Today's modern waffle bakers make it easy for us to serve waffles whenever we please. Canadians are particularly fond of waffles drizzled with syrup or honey. But they are coming more and more to utilize them in main dishes, as a base for such creamed foods as chipped beef and chicken a la king.

The appetite appeal of waffles can be used to advantage in the Lenten menu. A luncheon novelty that took our fancy features baked waffle squares each topped with a slice of good cheese, broiled just long enough to melt the cheese, and then garnished with a slice of broiled apple. It's a hot dish with mouth-melting flavor for February days.

You'll find it a distinct advantage to use cheese in slices as a topping for waffles.

Timely RECIPES

Here's a one-crust "Prune Pineapple Whip Pie" with plenty of good flavor and yet very light and fluffy. It's the kind of dessert we like to serve. All we need is a light touch of sweetness to finish off our meal. We suggest baking the crumb shell first before filling with the prune and pineapple mixture.

Prune Pineapple Whip Pie
1 1/2 cups cooked prunes
1/2 cup well-chilled evaporated milk
3 tablespoons lemon juice

1 No. 1 flat can crushed pineapple
6 tablespoons granulated sugar
Few grains salt
1 baked 9-inch graham cracker shell.

Cut prunes from pits into small pieces. Whip milk slightly, whip in the lemon juice a small portion at a time, and continue whipping until very stiff. Fold in the prunes. Combine pineapple, sugar and salt, and fold into cream mixture. Heap into crust. Chill. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.
