

Lewiston Broncs Back on Top As Spokes Bow to Victoria

The Western International League seesaw tilted again on Thursday night lifting Lewiston Broncs back atop the standings and dropping Spokane into the runner-up slot.

The Broncs regained first place with a 9-7 triumph over Victoria, scored while Spokane was bowing 5-1 at Yakima.

The night's activities left Lewiston 16 percentage points ahead of the Indians.

The faltering Salem Senators meanwhile lost a doubleheader to Edmonton 6-3 and 3-1 and fell three games back of the leaders. Tri-City shut out Calgary 4-0 in the league's other scheduled game.

Lewiston scored twice in the ninth inning to win the opener.

Rematch Slated For Layne, Walls

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Promoter Kenny Mayne states he is attempting to arrange a rematch between Utah fighter Rex Layne and the Canadian champion, Earl Walls, in Salt Lake City next month.

Originally, Mayne said, he planned the heavyweight fight Sept. 10, but couldn't get clearance for use of the Utah state fairgrounds. He notified Walls and the Canadian's manager now has signed for a fight in Canada on that date.

Mayne said he since has been notified that he can use fairgrounds facilities on Sept. 10, or can stage the fight later, possibly on Sept. 21.

Walls scored a first-round knockout over Layne at Edmonton early in the summer.

Casting Mark Set at Toledo

TOLEDO, O. (AP)—Bill Lovey of St. Louis, Mo., set a world record at the annual tournament of the National Association at Angling and Casting Clubs Wednesday.

Lovely won the 3/8-ounce distance bait event with an average of 364 2/3 feet. His longest cast was 375 feet.

Johnny Dieckman of Costa Mesa, Calif., won the 3/8-ounce spinning distance and the trout fly distance in the professional class. Dieckman's average in the spinning event was 200 and his longest cast totalled 212. His winning average in the trout fly was 153 1/3 feet with a long cast of 159.

Myron C. Gregory of Oakland, Calif., captured the trout fly distance in the official class with an average mark of 151 1/3 feet. His longest cast was 152.

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Big Crowd Sees Stars Dumped

If the Pacific Coast League is dying, as some of its critics insist, a lot of people are getting in early for the wake.

There were 21,440 fans at Wrigley Field Thursday night when Los Angeles Angels thumped Hollywood Stars 5-2. It was the largest crowd of the season on the Pacific slope, surpassing that of 18,940 on Memorial Day between these same clubs.

Second-place Seattle failed to gain on the Stars, dropping a 5-4 decision to Sacramento as Bob Dillinger scored the winning run in the last of the ninth. Milo Candini, who relieved Bud Watkins in the seventh, was the winner, and Art Del Luca, who succored Al Widmar in the seventh, the loser.

Bill Thomason of San Diego limited Portland to two hits as the Padres took the opener of their doubleheader, 6-1, in seven innings. Tom Alston's two-run homer in the 10th gave San Diego the second game, with Bob Kerrigan besting Jay Heard 7-4. The double loss dropped the Beavers into fifth place, only a half game ahead of the Padres.

San Francisco moved back into fourth place, a half game ahead of Portland in the hot first division battle. The Seals rallied for four singles and two runs in the eighth to beat Oakland, 8-6, and dropped the Aorns back into the PCL basement.
