BLACKWOOD on BRIDGE

Mr. Meek passed an acceptable opening bid in today's deal and Mr. Dale opened the bidding fourth hand. Now, since both opponents had passed, Mr. Meek was willing to take some strong action. He was afraid to bid just one spade as Mr. Dale might pass it. He therefore jumped to two no trump and Mr. Dale was so impressed with this action, coming from Mr. Meek, that he went on to game on his minimum holding.

Mr. Meek made his bid by means of an end-play. There was an effective line of defence against that play but Mr. Muzzy didn't see it. Incidentally, I think one reason why many players have such an aversion to dropping a king "unnecessarily" under an opposing ace is that they have a subconscious fear of "what partner will say."

But what can partner say when it can be shown that such a play could not possibly lose—and might gain?

ABEL DUCKS
 Mr. Muzzy led the king of diamonds and it was permitted to win. The queen of diamonds followed and Mr. Meek won with dummy's ace. He led the deuce of hearts from the board and fished the ten when Mr. Abel ducked.

Mr. Muzzy won with the jack and returned his last heart. Mr. Abel ducked again (a bad play) and Mr. Meek won with the king.

He now cashed four spades. Mr. Muzzy followed suit three times, then discarded the trey of diamonds. Mr. Abel had to make two discards and he chose two small hearts.

Next came the king of clubs and here Mr. Muzzy had to drop the jack or queen. He was down

to his original three clubs and to the jack-nine of diamonds. His side had won just two tricks. They needed three more. Obviously he could win only one club and one diamond—since the guarded ten of diamonds was still on the board.

It was now obvious to Mr. Muzzy. On the king of clubs, he played the trey. Mr. Meek then played the ace and another club and Mr. Muzzy was in. He cashed the jack of diamonds, but dummy's ten took the game-going trick.
